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GENERAL RULES

The **DOUGLAS COUNTY FAIR BOARD** makes all rules and regulations, and reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations. The board will settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of any connection with or incident to the fair.

Special rules are published for each department, when necessary. If there is a conflict between the special rules of any department and the general rules and regulations, the special rules will govern.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:

Conduct rules on the fairgrounds are in accordance with the regulations adopted by the Board of County Commissioners, **ABSOLUTELY NO ALCOHOLIC OR CEREAL MALT BEVERAGES** may be consumed or carried on the premises except designated areas. Violating exhibitors will have all entries disqualified.

ANIMAL CARE:

- The Fair Board will furnish pens only for animals entered.
- Commercial advertising by exhibitors on the fair grounds is prohibited unless approved by the Fair Board.
- All cattle and horses shall be halter broke and trained to lead. Owners must provide a suitable means of caring for animals at all times during the fair.
- Douglas County 4-H/FFA members are encouraged to groom their own livestock. During the fair, only the immediate family (to include parents, legal guardians, siblings, and grandparents) or other Douglas County 4-H/FFA members, may help an exhibitor with the grooming of their animals. After the first warning, violation of this rule may lead to total disqualification of the exhibitor from the show and all premiums forfeited. Anyone wishing to report unauthorized people grooming animals must follow the procedure as outlined in the Protest Rules. No misters or hoses for the watering or cooling livestock will be allowed in any livestock individual pens and/or arena area.
- To protect the safety and convenience of fair patrons, participants and exhibits, any person or persons interfering with or disrupting the exhibition and care of livestock or other exhibits may be removed from the 4-H fair grounds and/or subject to penalties in accordance with Home Rule Resolution No. HR-89-7-2.
- Exhibitors must keep livestock stalls clean and in a presentable condition for public viewing. Blocking chutes must be kept in designated areas. Tack, hay and show boxes must be kept in the proper areas. Cattle and other stock must be in the stalls for public viewing when not showing or being prepared for showing, until 8:00 p.m. each night. After 8:00 p.m. all beef and bucket calves may be taken to designated tie out areas. 4-H'ers are required to provide their own bedding for the tie out area.

WITHDRAWAL TIMES FOR DRUGS, GROWTH PROMOTANTS AND OTHER APPROVED MATERIALS:

Exhibitors, their parents, leaders, and instructors have a serious responsibility to use animal health products, growth promotants and any other approved materials with great care, only when needed and in correct amounts. Approved withdrawal times are set and must be followed to ensure that meat customers receive wholesome food. A Drug Withdrawal Certificate must be filled out for each market animal exhibited. Market livestock will not be allowed to be auctioned, or shipped as extras, without a completed certificate signed by the exhibitor and parent or guardian. The withdrawal date for medications and legal drugs will be the date that the auction cards are due, and the withdrawal certificate must be turned in with the auction card to the fair office for the animal to sell in the auction or be shipped as an extra animal.

NO PREMIUM PAID ON CONDEMNED CARCASS: The Fair Board will allow NO BASE BID TO BE PAID to any exhibitor of a market animal whose carcass is condemned by an official inspector because of any unethical practice such as giving by mouth or injection of any prohibited medication or the physical alteration of such carcass. The Fair Board reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, or carcass, found violating the use of drugs, chemicals, or feed additives. The exhibitor will forfeit the base value of the animal, ribbon premium money, prizes and possibly the premium amount paid by the buyer of the animal (at the discretion of the buyer). The class placing will not change.

ANIMAL DRUG TESTING:

Following the selection of Grand Champion and Reserve Champion in beef, goat, sheep, and swine a collection will be completed by the on-call veterinarian for testing. Animals are not to leave the designated area until instructed by said veterinarian.

RESIDUE AVOIDANCE- MEDICATION: The use of drugs, other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by the FDA, is a violation of federal law. Exhibitor and exhibitor's parents and/or legal guardians agree that: (1) they are absolutely and completely responsible persons for the care and custody of their animals; (2) the Douglas County Fair Board shall be entitled to disqualify an exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug, even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents and/or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and did not administer the drug; (3) the drug test results of the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents and/or legal guardians. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the Douglas County Fair Board shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor. Animals selected for drug testing will be tested under the terms of the Douglas County Fair Board Market Animal Testing Policies and Procedures. During the collection procedure, the exhibitor and designated responsible adult must be present at all times unless a substitute exhibitor is approved by the Superintendent. Following the collection, the exhibitor AND parent / guardian / responsible adult MUST sign the Douglas County Fair Board Drug Use Notification and Test Sample Collection form. Exhibitors found in violation of this rule may be subject to disqualification. If an exhibitor is disqualified due to a positive test result for an unapproved drug, the Douglas County Fair Board reserves the right to ban future entry.

Unapproved Drug Use: The showing of any animal that has been administered, or upon harvest or testing, or shows any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication, is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or any other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and / or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for animals to be harvested, including animals that may be destined for human consumption.

Approved Drug Use: If any animal has been administered any FDA drug approved for its species and class, sufficient time must have passed for the drug to clear the animal's system, so that the animal does not test positive for that drug. The showing of any animal that upon harvest or testing shows any quantity of any approved drug is strictly prohibited.

ATTIRE:

4-H and FFA exhibitors will be required to wear the provided 4-H T-shirt during all livestock shows. All 4-H'ers will receive ONE shirt. Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goat, and Horse exhibitors will be required to follow their show attire rules. 4-H T-shirts must also be worn by those competing in the Round Robin Showmanship competitions. T-Shirts may not be altered. This includes but is not limited to cutting, embellishing, or bleaching. Exhibitors who do not comply will be disqualified and forfeit any ribbons and premiums.

DUAL ENROLLMENT OF DOUGLAS COUNTY 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS:

Eligible youth may participate in both Douglas County 4-H and FFA but shall avoid duplication. Therefore, the following principles are required to be used in delivering the 4-H and FFA programs in Kansas as we strive to educate youth.

1. Agriculture Education teachers, FFA Advisors, Extension staff and local volunteers are encouraged to cooperate in sharing information and resources to provide educational opportunities for young people.
2. When young people are members of both 4-H and FFA, they plan and manage separate projects, and/or supervise agriculture experiences (SAE) programs.
3. FFA and 4-H members may enroll in the same area of experience in 4-H and FFA, however; participants cannot identify, nominate, manage, keep records on, or exhibit the same plants, animals, etc. in both organizations. Members must designate exhibits as either FFA or 4-H at weigh-in, registration or similar deadline.
4. Members may participate in judging contests and related events in FFA and 4-H but cannot represent both organizations at a contest, show or event at the same time.
5. When 4-H and FFA are conducting collaborating activities, both the 4-H and FFA organizations should be represented through emblems and information on all signs, print materials and awards.
6. Collaborating FFA and 4-H activities or events are obligated to have supervision representation from both organizations.

The above principles agree with Kansas 4-H and FFA and hereby affirmed by members and professionals in order to participate in either educational program (Memorandum of Understanding between the Kansas FFA Association and Kansas State University, State Office of 4-H Youth Development, July 19, 2023).

EDUCATIONAL EXHIBIT RULES:

[Astronomy, Building Block Engineering, Computers, Rocketry, Robotics, or Uncrewed Aerial Systems]

1. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
2. Exhibits are to have a clear link to the Engineering and Technology areas of astronomy, building block engineering, computers, rocketry, robotics, or uncrewed aerial systems, educational exhibits outside of these Engineering and Technology areas should be displayed in the other program areas. Just because an educational exhibit relates to the broad concept of Engineering and Technology does not qualify it to be displayed in the Engineering and Technology Educational Exhibit area. Exhibits that do not clearly show a clear and direct relationship to the Engineering and Technology project areas of ag-mechanics, ABC, astronomy, computers, robotics, rocketry, or UAS as previously defined will be disqualified.
3. Exhibits in posters, notebooks and display boards must contain substantial supporting educational materials.
4. Educational display boards, posters and notebooks should be creative and showcase details about the knowledge learned in the project during the current 4-H year. Value is placed on youth who can demonstrate how their skills have increased while completing the project. Each exhibit will be judged on uniqueness, creativity, neatness, accuracy of material, knowledge gained, and content.
5. Follow copyright laws, citing all sources of information in a standard notation. Sources of information must be cited on the front of your exhibit, including all posters and educational display boards.
6. Educational displays are not to exceed a standard commercial 4' high X 3' wide X 2' deep display board. No card table exhibits will be allowed.
7. "Construction Kits" that are part of educational displays must be contained in cases (tackle boxes, sealable containers, etc.) that may not be larger than 1' x 2' x 2' and must have a latch which securely keeps all components contained in the "Construction Kits". Other components are to adhere to appropriate dimensions as stated elsewhere.
8. Posters are limited to commercial 3' X 4" tri-fold display boards.
9. Educational Project notebooks must be organized in a 3-ring binder or similar book.
10. Any three-dimensional poster or display board exhibits may not be thicker than 2 inches.
11. Engines and igniters for rockets ARE NOT permitted with the exhibit and constitute an immediate disqualification. This is for safety reasons and includes both spent and live engines.
12. Exhibitor's name, county, age, and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the notebook, and/or "Construction Kit." For education displays and/or posters the exhibitor's name, county, or district, age, and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled on the back of the exhibit. Exhibit cards are not sufficient as they may be removed or repositioned for display. Failure to label an exhibit may result in one ribbon placing deduction.
13. Exhibits should possess the following qualities (in no order): a. A Central theme b. What you want others to learn c. Be designed and constructed in a manner befitting the exhibit d. Be something you are interested in.
13. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judge's discretion, may receive a reduced ribbon placing or disqualification.

ENTRY INFORMATION:

Pre-entries must be made for all 4-H/FFA divisions and Open Class Livestock by **JUNE 30**. Late entries will not be accepted. All pre-entries must be made through the on-line entry system. Go to the fair website, www.dgcountyfair.com for the link to on-line entries.

Out-of-county entries will be accepted in all Open Class Divisions.

- A 4-H member must be enrolled in the projects they exhibit, and their project enrollment on-line is complete by May 1 of the current year.

- Agricultural Education students or FFA members must exhibit projects included in their Supervised Agricultural Experience program or must be a school project under the Agricultural Education teacher's supervision.
- Any 4-H/FFA member who turns 19 years of age before January 1 of the current year will not be eligible to participate in 4-H/FFA competition.
- All exhibits must be owned by exhibitor if entered in competition, except where designated. No duplicate samples shall be taken from the same baking batch, bin, crib, field, tree and be shown by different exhibitors as their respective products.

FIRST AID:

A first aid station is located by the outdoor arena. Qualified first aid personnel are on duty from 8:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. each day of the fair.

INFORMATION:

The fair board office is located in Building 21S. The office is operated by the Douglas County Fair Board and staff, who can also supply information about local attractions and events. Prior to the week of the fair, information can be obtained by calling the Executive Administrator, Candice Lavalette at 785-424-4470 or checking the Fair Board website, www.dgcountyfair.com.

LIABILITY:

- Exhibitors and others who bring property of any kind upon the fair grounds, either exhibits or otherwise, do so at their own risk. The Douglas County Fair shall not be liable for loss or damage to such property from any cause whatsoever, and no such liability shall be created or presumed from any supervision over exhibits exercised by the association or its employees. All persons who have exhibits, particularly those of great sentimental and/or monetary value, should carefully make their own determination of whether such exhibits should be exposed to the hazards of the Fair.
- All exhibitors shall be liable to the Douglas County Fair for any damage to the grounds or property of the Douglas County Fair by such exhibitor, their agents, employees, or property. All exhibitors shall hold the Douglas County Fair harmless from liability for any damage to their persons, or their property.
- The association reserves the right to require bond from any exhibitor to protect it against liability in such amount as the Douglas County Fair may determine.
- The Douglas County Fair Board will not be responsible for overnight supervision of 4-H/FFA members.

LIVESTOCK ENTRIES:

- All animals must undergo a veterinary health inspection prior to entry. Animals must be free of contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases; external parasites; and any conditions that could pose a risk to other animals or exhibitors. Animals must be sound, in good physical condition, and able to move normally without signs of severe lameness, injury, or distress. Any animal exhibiting signs of illness (including but not limited to fever, diarrhea, respiratory symptoms, skin lesions, or eye infections), heavy parasite infestation, or evidence of drug misuse or rule violations will be denied entry and required to leave the grounds immediately.
- All livestock must arrive on the grounds between 6:00-9:00 p.m., Monday July 28th. Stall assignments will be pre-assigned by the specie superintendent(s).
- All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified with Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
- The Douglas County Fair has transitioned to a fit show for the market and breeding divisions, showmanship included. Grooming for the breeding and market animal shows may include the use of adhesives, paints, and powders. Twine, other artificial material, or hair not from the animal itself are not allowed.
- The check-in and weigh-in times will be Tuesday as follows: 8:00 a.m. for market and dairy goats. 8:00 a.m. for sheep. Swine will start weighing at 9:00 a.m. Beef and bucket calves will start check-in and weighing at 8:00 a.m.
- The exhibitor, a family member or other responsible person must be present to bring the animals to the scales. It is not the weighing committee's responsibility to get the animals to the scales. If the exhibitor

is not present to have their animals in order, they will be skipped and have to bring their animals to the scales at the end of the line, and by the allotted time for that species.

- No parking in livestock building area. Temporary parking to unload allowed only mornings of the fair to 8:00 a.m. No vehicle traffic allowed from 8:00 a.m. to closing of grounds 12:00 midnight.
- The Fair Board will furnish pens only for animals entered. Beef and Bucket Calf exhibitors are required to include the appropriate bedding fee along with their entries to cover the cost of wood chips. All other livestock entries must provide their own bedding.
- Commercial advertising by exhibitors on the fair grounds is prohibited unless approved by the fair board. All cattle and horses shall be halter broke and trained to lead.
- Animals can be shown in only one class other than group classes and showmanship. Animals shown in market classes are not eligible for breeding classes and vice versa. This applies to both 4-H and Open Class entries. Animals are considered either breeding or market animals and cannot be shown as a market animal in 4-H and a breeding animal in Open.
- Livestock exhibitors must exhibit and present their entries without assistance in the show ring and failure on the part of the contestant to exhibit the entry may bar them from participation in any awards. In case of an exhibitor who has two entries in the same class or a physical disability, owners may have another Douglas County 4-H/FFA member assist with an entry provided it meets with the approval of the superintendent of the department. The assistant must be a Douglas County 4-H/FFA member and be enrolled in the same project they are helping with.
- Anyone wishing to report unauthorized people grooming animals must first report the violation to the head superintendent. The matter will then be taken to the Fair Board.
- A 4-H/FFA member must own and exhibit in the regular classes animals used in showmanship classes. No animal may be entered in showmanship without also being shown in a regular class. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.
- Exhibitors leasing a breeding animal [max 2/species] must have an Animal Leasing Identification Form on file with the Extension Office by June 15th. [Lease Form](#)

LOST AND FOUND:

All lost and found articles and inquiries will be handled by the fair office in Building 21S. They can be reached by phone at 785-841-6322.

OVERNIGHT CAMPERS:

The Douglas County Fair Board will not be responsible for overnight supervision of 4-H/FFA members.

PREMIUMS:

- Premiums will be paid by check within 30 days after the conclusion of the fair. Premium checks must be cashed within 30 days of issue, to insure payment. After that time, any premium checks which have not been cashed will be considered donated to the Douglas County Fair.
- If any dispute should arise over prizes, the record in the secretary's books shall stand as true. Awards will be based on the Danish system for 4-H/FFA (Purple, Blue, Red, and White based on a standard).
- Purple ribbons will be awarded in all non-livestock divisions which may be eligible for state entry.
- Open Class, American system (ranked 1, 2, and 3), receives ribbons and premiums.
- Grand Champions shall be selected from the group of Division Champions. Reserve Grand Champions shall be selected from the group of Division Champions and Division Reserve Champions.
- All awards, donor contributions, and sponsorships—whether monetary or in-kind (physical items or services)—must be coordinated exclusively through the Board Executive Administrator. Individuals, committees, or external parties are not permitted to independently solicit, accept, or distribute donations, awards, or sponsorships on behalf of the Fair without prior approval and processing through the Board Executive Administrator. This policy ensures proper documentation, equitable distribution, and accurate recognition of all contributors.

PREMIUM FORFEITURE:

- Superintendents are instructed that if they have proof that an exhibitor, by false entry or otherwise, attempts to receive or obtain an award by misrepresentation, said exhibitor shall forfeit all prizes awarded on all exhibits.

- Judges will be instructed not to award premiums on unworthy articles, or give first premiums where only one is entered in a class unless it merits a first. No red ribbon or lower rating exhibits can receive Champion or Grand Champion.
- Any exhibitor or family of exhibitor interfering with or criticizing judges' decisions openly or otherwise will forfeit premiums if due proof is received by the Fair Board. Parents should not actively participate in consultation judging. However, they may observe.
- 4-H exhibitors (individual or group) should avoid using copyrighted materials whenever possible by originating his/her own work. A 4-H member or group should use with caution, a copyrighted and/or trademarked product or service (a brand name, label or product).

PROTEST:

- Any person may protest the qualification or eligibility of any competing person, animal or object submitted for competition and showing any pertinent class or event to the fair board by the following procedure:
- Any complaint regarding eligibility or adherence to the rules must be made in writing to the Rules Committee, within twenty-four (24) hours following the occasion of the protest.
- Upon receipt of a protest, the Rules Committee will promptly notify the person against whom the protest was made, the superintendent of the department for the class or event, and other parties who may have relevant information to the protest.
- The notice will give a time and place for a hearing to address the protest.
- When a protest is either allowed or denied, the course of action shall be entered in writing and a copy delivered to the protestant and the person against whom the protest was made. In the event that a timely protest is properly filed before judging, and a decision is delayed until after judging, the judges will be informed by the board to place a conditional and reserve award upon the winning entry. Premiums and awards will be properly distributed when final decision on the protest is made.

RELEASE OF EXHIBITS:

- All exhibits will be released from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. on Sunday.
- Dogs, Horses and Pets will be released after showing.
- Any exhibitor removing any exhibits prior to release time will forfeit all premiums and prize money.
- Every article or animal upon the grounds for exhibition shall, during the Fair, be under the control of the Fair Board, and will not be permitted to leave without their consent; exhibits may be released with recommendation of veterinarian and/or division superintendent.

STATE FAIR ENTRIES:

- Exhibitors planning to exhibit at the State fair must make entries at the Extension Office by 5:00 p.m., August 5th. NOTE: the minimum age for participation in the 4-H Division at the Kansas State Fair is 9 years of age by January 1, of the current year, for all competitive exhibits and contests. Only exhibitors whose exhibits receive a Purple ribbon and meet the age and class requirements in the 4-H/FFA Division may enter their exhibits at the Kansas State Fair. This applies to all entries except livestock. All livestock exhibitors whose entries place in a blue ribbon group are encouraged to exhibit at the State Fair, provided they can meet the requirements.
- Please note that the State Fair and County rules may vary in wording per project. Always check both set of rules when moving onto State Fair. State Fair and County Fair class numbers will not be the same.

UNETHICALLY FITTED LIVESTOCK:

- The showing of unethically fitted livestock, the showing of livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the classes entered, or the misrepresentation of breeding or milking status is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of changing the normal conformation of any part of the animals' body or using drugs, including over the counter and/or extra-label, or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup and/or performance of the animal. This includes but is not limited to the following:
- Animals that are in milk due to an unnaturally induced lactation.
- Balancing the udder by any means other than leaving naturally produced milk in any or all quarters.

- Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, internally or externally, with an irritant, counterirritant, or other substance to temporarily improve conformation. Minimizing the effects of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs and depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment except normal exercise. Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or switching of the tail.
- Striking the animals to cause swelling in a depressed area.
- Surgery or other practices performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide, or hair, except the removal of warts or horns and the permitted clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.
- Insertion of foreign material under the skin.
- Changing the color of hair at any point, spot, or area on the animals' body. Any grooming material that allows color to come off any animal will not be allowed at the show.
- The use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
- The use of diuretics.
- Administration of a drug internally or externally. Animals under the care of a licensed veterinarian, and/or taking any type of medication are ineligible.
- All medication administered during the livestock show must be administered by the Fair Board Veterinarian and a written medication record must be filed. Animals receiving performance enhancing drugs (i.e., including, but not limited to, steroids, diuretics, and anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers, and pain killers) in this manner are ineligible for competition.

The term "drug" shall mean any substance for which the sale, possession or use is controlled by license under federal, state, or local laws or regulation and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions which affects the circulatory, respiratory, muscularly, skeletal or central nervous system of any species of livestock. If drugs are used by the Official Show Veterinarian to treat a recognized disease in market animals, the withdrawal times listed by the drug manufacturer will be strictly followed.

Any exhibitor, who is found to have tampered with or who inhumanely abuses an animal or enters an exhibit that is not eligible or does not abide by the Douglas County Fair Board rules, will be barred from showing and must forfeit any premium, ribbon, or prize won.

OTHER:

- ALL JUDGE'S DECISIONS ARE FINAL except where otherwise noted.
- Exhibits that include nudity or explicit visual content are not permitted. This applies to all forms of display, including artwork, photographs, digital media, sculptures, and live presentations. The Fair Board reserves the right to review exhibits for appropriateness and to remove any entry that does not align with these guidelines.
- No disorderly conduct of any kind will be permitted.
- All people occupying community areas are required to keep their places in a sanitary condition and those who have their meals on the grounds are requested to leave no paper or other litter.
- A police force will be on grounds sufficient to prevent the same, to see that all rules are observed.
- No dogs, except Dog Division entries and Assistance Dogs, shall be permitted on the fairgrounds during the Douglas County Fair. Cycles, bikes, recreational scooters, or horses will not be ridden on the blacktop or other exhibit areas.

Good sportsmanship shall always be observed. The judges' decision is final. Poor sportsmanship may lead to loss of ribbon, class dismissal, or disqualification from the show as determined by the judge. Any protest should be made by writing to the Fair Board Rule Committee. Exhibitors, parents, and volunteers are not to approach the judge directly.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION 4-H/FFA

5:30 p.m., Saturday August 1st

1. Only Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Lambs, Market Goats, Meat Pens of Rabbits, and Meat Pens of Chickens will be sold in the terminal auction. All Grand and Reserve Champion Market Beef, Lambs, Swine, Goats, and Meat Pens of Rabbits & Chickens have the option to sell in the auction, be harvested at a designated destination, and be drug tested. Exhibitors may only sell one animal in the auction, and it must be registered in said 4-H'ers name.
2. All animals shown as market animals must be registered with the Auction Committee by 1 pm on Friday, July 31st, 2026 in the Fair Board office. All weigh cards must be turned in with the destination marked on the back of the card indicating whether the animal will be sold, shipped, taken home, or sold on a private treaty (to whom and what locker plant it is to be shipped to). Those not registered as auction animals will not sell. There will be no exceptions.
3. Weights will be taken at the initial weigh-in of the fair. The minimum weight for animals to sell in the premium auction will be Market Beef 1,100 lbs.; Market Swine 220 lbs.; Sheep 90 lbs.; Goats 50 lbs.
4. Animals shown in Feeder Classes are eligible for sale as extra animals at the discretion of the floor buyer. Extra animals will receive a base bid and will be loaded on the truck immediately following the livestock auction.
5. All animals selling either through the livestock auction or as extra animals will have a commission fee deducted from their total selling price. Commission fees will be 2% of the total sale price for Market Beef, and 4% of the total selling price for Market Hogs, Market Lambs, Market Goats, Meat Pen of Rabbits, and Champion Meat Pen of Chickens. Commission fees will be deducted from the seller's check by the auction committee. Commission fees cover auction expenses and are not paid to auctioneers. All species promotional check-off dollars will be deducted from the seller's check.
6. Once an animal is sold and loaded it will not be recalled from the load or unloaded.
7. The Auction Committee will photograph the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals immediately following the sale of the animal in the ring.
8. Exhibitors must be present to sell the animal and handle the animal in the auction ring. Hardship cases will be reviewed by the Rules Committee of the Fair Board.
9. All animals sold will be officially weighed by the Fair Board and Auction Committee.
10. This is a terminal auction, and all animals going through the auction will come out of the ring and go into the proper pen prior to loading on the truck.
11. The premium auction will be rotated between species annually as follows:
 - 2026 - Beef, Sheep, Swine, Market Goats, Rabbits, Chickens
 - 2027 - Chickens, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Market Goats, Rabbits
 - 2028 - Rabbits, Chickens, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Market Goats
12. Auction checks will be available for pick up at the Extension office on a date that will be announced after the fair. Those 4-H'ers receiving checks must present a written thank-you note to their buyer in a stamped envelope to the Extension Office to receive their checks. All checks must be picked up by October 1st or will be considered donated to the Auction Committee.

Douglas County 4-H and FFA CLASSES

AEROSPACE/ROCKETRY 4-H/FFA

Department 170

Superintendent: *Breven Flory*

The Kansas Aerospace/Rocketry program is designed to allow 4-H members to explore aerospace through rockets of various sizes. Kansas 4-H has adopted the National Association of Rocketry's rules, regulations, and safety guidelines.

Rules:

1. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the 4-H STEM-Rocketry program to exhibit in this division.
2. All rockets displayed in this division must be constructed during the current 4-H year.
3. If a rocket qualified for the Kansas State Fair, exhibitors should read the State Fair Rules for the Rocketry division as they may be different from those at the county fair.
4. Each exhibitor may enter up to two rocket exhibits that have been constructed during the current year. If two rockets are entered, one rocket must be a "model rocket kit" or the second may be entered into any other applicable class. An exhibitor may not enter two rockets in the same class.
5. 4-Hers are to complete and sign the rocketry information form, available from <http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/> or your local extension office and attach it to a 10"X13" "manila" envelope. Any rocket exhibit not including this completed envelope will receive a participation ribbon. The envelope should contain:
 - Instructions on how to construct the rocket
 - Up to 5 pages of pictures from both construction and launch
 - Documentation of any flight damage that occurred
 - Any modifications made to the rocket
 - If needed, an additional page for altitude calculations if the space on the form is not enough.Additionally, for original design rockets, also known as "scratch built" rockets:
 - 5 additional pages of photos are allowed
 - Exhibitor must provide all necessary details on how to construct the rocket, require the rocket to be swing tested, and documented to show a stable flight. Failure to test and document flight stability following modifications will result in two ribbon placing deductions.
6. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's rocket, at the judges' discretion, will receive a participation ribbon.
7. Rockets are to be displayed upright on a display stand with a sturdy rod that does not extend past the top of the rocket or stand unassisted, unless the rocket is taller than 4 feet in which case no display stand is required and the rocket may be displayed on its side, rockets are not to be displayed on launch pads to save space and prevent someone from being poked in the eye.
8. Rockets ARE NOT to be displayed with used or unused rocket engines either in the rocket or as part of the stand, if rocket engines are included in the exhibit the judge may disqualify the exhibit.
9. Rockets should be flown unless there is an active burn ban in the county or conditions are too dangerous to safely launch the rocket. Just flying the last stage (the part with the nose cone) of a multi-stage rocket is acceptable.
10. All rockets, except those in the JR division, are not to be "beginner's kits" or use prefabricated fin assemblies or pre-finished rockets requiring no painting, these are not acceptable outside the JR division, and should be disqualified
11. Angles of fins must fall within a plus or minus 2-degree variation using an approved fin alignment guide (such as KSSTAC10).
12. Fins and body tubes, except those in the except beginner kits, are to be filled and sealed with sanding sealer and/or primer or other suitable filler to eliminate the appearance of body grooves and wood grain. Fins should be rounded or streamlined according to instructions. Additionally, other exposed fin edges can be rounded, unless the directions specifically say to leave the flat. Quality fin rounding, beyond that described in the instructions, should not result in a ribbon deduction.
13. Fins and launch lugs are to be filleted to reduce drag and properly secure them to the model.
14. Engine mounts are to be securely attached to the body tube.
15. Any seams on plastic parts are to be sanded smoothly.
16. The recovery system (typically a parachute or streamer) should be attached according to the instructions
17. The nose cone fits snugly but still allows for easy removal.
18. Exhibits, except "beginner's kits," must be uniformly painted and smoothly finished or finished as per rocket instructions, and have decals applied smoothly.

19. Models may not be judged based on their painting scheme (colors and placement on the rocket). Rockets do not have to follow the suggested paint scheme, allowing the 4-H'er to display maximum creativity at the finishing of their rocket. Under no circumstances is the weight given to the paint scheme to be sufficient, by itself, to move a non-scale model from one ribbon placing to another.
 20. "Scale models", exhibited in the scale model class, may be judged based on their paint scheme. The judge may deduct up to one ribbon placing for not following the paint scheme.
 21. "Scale Model" Rockets, exhibited in the scale model class, are to be finished and completed with a majority (greater than 70%) of decals.
 22. Original design rockets cannot be a modification of a pre-existing kit and must be of original design.
 23. Original design rockets must be designed by the exhibitor(s).
 24. Exhibitor(s) must be 11 years of age (4-H age) or older to enter an original design rocket.
 25. Original design rockets must include detailed instructions, so that someone could construct the original designed rocket just like a kit purchased at a store. Instructions can be as many pages as needed to convey full and complete construction techniques, including fin templates.
 26. For a rocket entered in the original design classes, describe in the summary how the rocket was tested for stability prior to flying. Swing testing of the rocket is required. Other tests and calculations are encouraged. Exhibitors must include documentation of the swing test. Failure to swing test a rocket will result in a deduction of TWO ribbon placings.
 27. A minimum of one additional page must be added to the rocketry information pack detailing the test(s) performed to ensure stability. 4-Hers are strongly encouraged to provide as much detail as possible. Failure to provide adequate written documentation will result in a disqualification.
 28. Rockets that use more than one 'D' engine or equivalent are considered mid or high-power rockets in 4-H.
 29. Mid and High-Power exhibitors must be at least 14 years of age by January 1 of the current year.
 30. In addition to the information packet completed for all rockets, a high-power information form is to be completed and placed inside of the information packet. This may be downloaded from www.KansasSpaceTech.com.
 31. Exhibitors in the mid and high-power divisions must hold memberships in either NAR or Tripoli organizations.
 32. The NAR High Power Rocket Safety Code applies to the construction and launching of all rockets displayed in this division. As such all mid and high-power rocketry exhibitors must comply with the NAR High Power Rocket Safety Code that is in effect as of October 1st of the current 4-H year.
 33. All rockets in the mid and high-power divisions are to be launched under adult supervision by the 4-H member who constructed the rocket.
 34. For rockets launched using an engine(s) that have 160.1 ('H' engine or equivalent number of smaller engines) Newton's-seconds of thrust or larger, adult supervision must be provided by an individual having at least a level 1 high power certification. The 4-H member should also hold or be attempting to attain their level 1 high power certification if launching on this large of an engine.
- * As defined by the National Association of Rocketry (NAR), a scale model is "any model rocket that is a true scale model of an existing or historical guided missile, rocket vehicle, or space vehicle." The intent of scale modeling is, according to the NAR, "to produce an accurate, flying replica of a real rocket vehicle that exhibits maximum craftsmanship in construction, finish, and flight performance." (NAR "Pink Book" 50.1 4-1)
- Champion and Reserve Champion exhibits will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
35. See general rules regarding specific educational display, notebook, and poster board rules.

Scale Model Definition:

As defined by the NAR, a scale model is any rocket that is true scale model of an existing or historical guided missile, rocket vehicle, or space vehicle, that has flown under rocket power. The intent of scale modeling is, according to NAR, "is to produce an accurate, flying replica of a real rocket powered vehicle that is judged for craftsmanship in construction, finish, and flight performance."

Level I [7–8-year-olds]

3128: Rocket from kit; Include plans.

3129: Rocket original design. Include plans.

3130: Rocketry Educational Display, Notebook, or Poster Board

Level II [9–11-year-olds]

3131: Rocket from kit; include plans.

3132: Rocket original design. Include plans.

3133: Rocketry Educational Display, Notebook, or Poster Board

Level III [12–14-year-olds]

3134: Rocket from kit; include plans.

3135: Rocket original design by exhibitor, not merely modification of an existing kit rocket. Include original plans.

3136: Scale Model Rocket designed by exhibitor: not merely a modification of an existing kit. Include original plans and stability testing.

3141: Rocketry Educational Display, Notebook, or Poster Board

Level IV [15–18-year-olds]

3137: Rocket from kit; include plans.

3138: Rocket original design by exhibitor, not merely modification of an existing kit rocket. Include original plans.

3139: Scale Model Rocket made from kit, Include plans.

3140: Scale Model Rocket designed by exhibitor: not merely a modification of an existing kit. Include original plans and stability testing.

3142: Rocketry Educational Display, Notebook, or Poster Board

Mid-power Rocketry (2x'D' to 'G' Engines) Guidelines:

Purpose: To allow for improved safety and judging of rockets that meet the requirements of 4-H mid-power rockets.

1. Exhibitors must be at least 14 years of age by January 1 of the current year.
2. The rules for ALL categories apply.
3. In addition to the information packet completed for all rockets, a high/mid power information form is to be completed and placed inside of the information packet. This may be downloaded from <http://www.kansas4-H.org/>. Click on KSF Packet link.
4. Exhibitors in this division must hold memberships in either NAR or Tripoli organizations.
5. The NAR Model Rocket Safety code applies to the construction and launching of all rockets displayed in this division. As such all exhibitors must comply with the NAR Model Rocket Safety Code that is in effect as of October 1st of the current year. However, if there is a modification in this code the SpaceTech Action Team may review and implement the modified code.
6. All rockets in this division are to be launched under adult supervision by the 4-H member who constructed the rocket.
7. High power rockets as defined above ('H' or 'I' engines) may not be launched in this division.
8. If according to Federal Aviation Regulations Part 101, a waiver is required to fly the rocket, a copy of that waiver is to be attached to the High-Power Information Form. In the case where the launch was a public event a substitute to a copy of the waiver is the Range Safety Officers (RSO's) contact information.
9. Mid- Power rockets may be displayed without a supporting stand. If a supporting stand is used, it is not to exceed 4-1/4" (four and one-quarter inch) thick and 8" square. The exhibitor's name, county or district, and age must be labeled on the base.

High Power Rocketry ('H' or 'I' engines) Guidelines

Propose: To allow for improved safety and judging of rockets that meet the following requirements:

1. Exhibitors must be at least 14 years of age by January 1 of the current year. This is to align with NAR certification guidelines.
2. The rules for ALL categories apply.
3. In addition to the information packet completed for all rockets, a high-power information form is to be completed and placed inside of the information packet. This may be downloaded from <http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/>. Click on KSF Packet link.
4. Exhibitors in this division must hold memberships in either NAR or Tripoli organizations.
5. The NAR High Power Rocket Safety Code applies to the construction and launching of all rockets displayed in this division. As such all exhibitors must comply with the NAR High Power Rocket Safety Code that is in effect as of October 1st of the current 4-H year. However, if there is a modification in this code the SpaceTech Action Team may review and implement the modified code.
6. All rockets in this division are to be launched under adult supervision by the 4-H members who constructed the rocket.
7. For rockets launched using an engine(s) that are 160.1 ('H' engine or equivalent number of smaller engines) Newton's-seconds or larger, adult supervision must be provided by an individual having at least a level 1 high-power certification.
 - a. The 4-H member should also hold or be attempting to attain their level 1 high power certification, and should include supporting documentation of such (for example, a copy of Level 1 card is sufficient).

8. If according to Federal Aviation Regulations Part 101, a waiver is required to fly the rocket, a copy of that waiver is to be attached to the High-Power Information Form. In the case where the launch was a public event for a substitute to a copy of the waiver is the Range Safety Officers (RSO's) contact information.

AG MECHANICS WELDING 4-H/FFA

Department 500

This project allows youth to explore areas of ag mechanics welding and metallurgy from repairing or repurposing existing items, to fabricating new ones. The intent is for this program to start with foundational areas, some of which youth may already have, and allow them to continue to build on this knowledge, becoming more experienced.

Rules

1. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the Kansas 4-H Ag Mechanics Welding project to exhibit in this division.
2. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. Exhibits must have been constructed or repaired during the current 4-H year.
3. Wheeled exhibits must utilize a braking mechanism which prevents the exhibit from freely rolling while on display.
4. Exhibitors are responsible for providing sufficient braking or "chocks" for trailer or wheeled exhibits to ensure that the exhibits do not move once positioned. If using a wheel "chocking" mechanism, the two individual blocks should be connected as a pair of chocks, so they do not become separated. At least one pair of chocks should be placed on each side of the trailer to prevent movement.
5. For trailer exhibits the tongue of the trailer should be equipped with a locking mechanism (e.g. padlock) to prevent the trailer from being moved by unauthorized individuals while on display. A key for the locking mechanism should be left with the superintendent.
6. Exhibits with downward swinging parts, such as tailgates, that could pose a fall/striking/crushing hazard should have a tamper resistant locking mechanism such as a "zip-tie" or a "cotter-key" through a release pin that would prevent the swinging part from being accidentally released and falling on someone.
7. Each exhibit must be free-standing or sufficiently supported by an exhibitor supplied support system that is movable and is part of the total dimensions and weight of the exhibit. Exhibit display boards should have a portable and moveable base and examples should be firmly affixed to the board to ensure all parts of the display stay together. No exhibits may be staked to the ground for display.
8. Top heavy items should be braced or placed in a stand sufficient to prevent them from topping over while on display.
9. No sealed vessels are allowed. All vessels must be properly vented, for example, a water tank with a fill cap, or a drilled hole for empty chambers that allow pressure to equalize. Exhibits not properly vented will be disqualified.
10. Tanks are to be triple rinsed, dried and free of all liquid residue.
11. As exhibitors build their exhibits, appropriate PPE (Personal Protection Equipment) is required.
12. Display cases for small exhibits are acceptable and must be easily opened so the item can be removed and examined as part of judging.
13. Exhibits that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession, or creation, physical and/or electrical that is intended to be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.

14. If the exhibit is powered by flammable liquids (gas, propane, kerosene, etc.) the fuel tank and lines should be drained and allowed to dry, to avoid spills and potential fires.
15. Electric power (battery, corded, solar, or alternative energy) should have a primary shutoff or disconnect switch.
16. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, may receive a reduced ribbon placement or disqualification.
17. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H STEM Ag Mechanics Welding Exhibit Information Form" for each exhibit, except for display boards, which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://welding.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
18. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items: a. Bill of materials for the project with associated costs, scrap items used may be listed as having a \$0.00 cost. b. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state. c. If applicable, schematics or working drawings relating to the creation or repair, this is not required for display boards. d. If appropriate operating instructions.

8. At least two photographs showing telescope construction and operation are required. Photographs should be mounted on one side of an 8 1/2 "x 11" page. A brief caption should accompany each photograph. Place photos in the 10" x 13" manila envelope. Up to 10 pages of pictures can be included.
9. The telescope must be properly assembled and painted with a smooth and uniform finish.
10. Exhibitor's name, county, age, and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled on the telescope.
11. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, will receive a participation ribbon.

3. All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified by Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
4. Market Beef must have been weighed and identified to a 4-H'er enrolled in Beef at the official spring weigh-in on March 8th, and this information recorded on official forms in the Douglas County Extension Office. Leased breeding animals must have a lease ID form signed and on file in the Extension Office by June 15.
5. Steer classes will be divided (if warranted) by weight such that each class will consist of 10 or fewer animals. There will be one market heifer class.
6. Steers must be physical castrates.
7. A maximum of three (3) market beef (market or feeder) will be allowed per exhibitor.
8. Market Steers must be registered to be shown in the purebred market classes. Original registration or transfer papers for steers must be in the name of the exhibitor by June 15 of the current year. Animals may be co-registered by 2 or more youth in the same family but cannot be registered in a farm name or cannot include the name of adults. Steers without registration papers will show in the Crossbred class. Papers must be presented at check-in.
9. Champion and Reserve Champion market beef in each breed may compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
10. A maximum of two (2) breeding females per age may be shown by exhibitor.
11. Animals shown in market classes are not eligible for breeding classes and vice versa. This applies to both 4-H and Open Class entries. Animals are considered either breeding or market animals, not both.
12. Breed champions will be selected before moving on to the next breed.
13. Original registration or transfer papers for animals in the breeding classes must be in the name of the exhibitor by June 15 of the current year. Animals may be co-registered by 2 or more youth in the same family. Breeding animals registered in a farm name or whose papers include the name of adults are not eligible to show. 4-H/FFA breeding animals that are not registered may show in the Commercial Class. For Breeding Heifers under 90 days of age, dam and sire registration information and a sales receipt will suffice. Papers must be presented at check-in. The calves in the cow/calf classes may also show in their respective breeding class provided they have the necessary breed registration papers.
14. Champion Breeding Females will be chosen in each breed from the seven (7) breeding heifer classes and the aged female classes. Cow/calf pairs are not included. Champion and Reserve females from each breed, other purebreds, and commercial classes will compete for the Supreme and Reserve Supreme Female awards.
15. Cattle must be in the stalls for public viewing when not showing or being prepared for showing until 8:00 p.m. each night. After 8:00 p.m. all beef and bucket calves may be taken to a designated tie out area. 4-H'ers are required to provide their own bedding for the tie out area. Pens inside of the cattle tie out area are prohibited unless stated otherwise by superintendents and County agents.
16. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. Inspection will take place before the animal(s) have been unloaded at the fairgrounds. Cattle determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts, or infested with mange will not be permitted to show.
17. For animals to be exhibited in a Showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animals in a regular class. No animal may be entered in showmanship without also being shown in a regular class. Bulls cannot be shown in showmanship classes. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.

10. If numbers warrant additional classes will be added.
11. Bucket calves are not eligible for state fairs.
12. Cattle and other stock must be in the stalls for public viewing when not showing or being prepared for showing, until 8:00 p.m. each night. After 8:00 p.m. all beef and bucket calves may be taken to designated tie out areas. 4-H'ers are required to provide their own bedding for the tie out area. Pens inside of the cattle tie out area are prohibited unless stated otherwise by superintendents and County agents.
13. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. Inspection will take place after the animal(s) have been unloaded at the fairgrounds. BUILDING BLOCK ENGINEERING 4-H

Department 1450

Superintendent: *Erik & Marisa Dallman*

The BBE exhibit area focuses on using architectural blocks (“Legos”) to construct dioramas. This project allows youth to explore architectural design in a three-dimensional space. The intent for this program is to allow youth to explore the construct and gain knowledge through interaction with a common toy.

Rules

1. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the Kansas 4-H Building Block Engineering project to exhibit in this division.
2. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit. Exhibits must have been constructed during the current 4-H year.
3. Total exhibition dimensions may not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep.
4. The minimum exhibit dimensions must be at least 6 inches wide and deep.
5. All exhibits may be placed in a sturdy see-through enclosure with a top, bottom, and 4 sides. A ‘clear’ tub turned upside down with the exhibit placed on the lid would be an acceptable enclosure. It may be desirable to place a cutting board or other hard surface between the lid and base plate of the exhibit to make it sturdier. This is to keep exhibit components from being “scattered to parts unknown” at the fair. The outer dimensions of the enclosure do not count towards the total exhibit dimensions but should not be excessive. The entire exhibit should fit in the display enclosure, so the enclosure does not smash into the exhibit during movement. Exhibitor entry tag must be in a prominent location on the display. Cases are to be removable and should not be bolted down, glued, or sealed in any way that prevents judges from touching the actual display. (Locking handles and snap shut lids are fine.)
6. All components used in construction should be dust and hair free, clean, free of chips, scuffs, cracks, or broken blocks.
7. Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks unless they fit with the story, for example an earthquake.
8. The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego®.
9. Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks, for example marbles for small round objects
10. The use of existing “store bought” sets for major elements of the display are not allowed. Use of figurines from sets is allowed as is using individual bricks or small sub-assemblies to create something different than the set it came from. For example, a car hood or front end from a car kit could be used in a

“car museum,” just not the entire car. The intent of this is to ensure fairness among exhibitors and encourage maximum creativity instead of just following a set of plans.

11. Weapons are not prohibited in dioramas. Scenes depicting battles, like you would find in museums, are acceptable exhibits. However, blood and “gore” is not to be added and will result in a ribbon place deduction.

12. Dioramas should be suitably complex and have multiple elements. They can be of buildings (inside/outside), natural spaces, imaginative/fictional areas, compartments of vehicles, logic puzzles, about anything you can think of that’s not a picture or artwork. For example, a campsite that has a log cabin, a tree fort, and a car.

13. All dioramas should have a story, which is part of the information pack, that describes what is happening in the diorama; this can be as simple (the nursery rhyme “Jack and Jill” for example) or complex as needed to explain to someone looking at the exhibit what is happening.

14. Vehicles that are intended to stay in a single place should be affixed to base plates with sticky tack, hot glue, or other method

15. Mechanical enhancements or motion elements that add motion to the diorama are acceptable and encouraged. For example, merry-go-rounds, doors, elevators, gears, marbles going down a channel, flapping wings, animatronics, etc. If included, judges should be able to use them and instructions should be provided for operation either in the story or on a separate page.

16. Artistic designs, for example recreating paintings like the “Mona Lisa” or “Stary Nights” and structures like “David” are not permitted as exhibits and one ribbon placing should be deducted. These exhibits should be displayed in Visual Arts.

17. Each exhibitor is required to complete the “4-H Building Block Engineering Exhibit Information Form” which is available through your local K-State Extension office or at <http://blocks.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10” x 13” manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit. All revisions of forms previously released for the division dated prior to current year are void for use and new forms must be obtained and used that are dated by the Kansas State 4-H Office for the current year.

18. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items: a. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state. Final pictures help in determining where a part might go in case something comes loose. b. If appropriate operating instructions for mechanical portions of the diorama.

19. See general rules regarding specific educational display, notebook, and poster board rules.

The Kansas 4-H Computer Science project is designed to allow 4-H members to explore how information is moved from one part of the computer to the other; how information is moved between two or more computer systems (networking); how information is stored; or how information is acted on (programming).

Rules:

1. The actual construction of computer hardware (i.e., building a computer, electronic devices with a motherboard-based manipulation) will remain in the Energy Management division.
2. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the 4-H Computer project to exhibit in this division.
3. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. Exhibits must have been completed during the current 4-H year.
4. Exhibitor's name, county, 4-H age, and years(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the exhibit, educational display, notebook, and/or poster.
5. See general rules regarding specific educational display, notebook, and poster board rules.
6. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, may receive a reduced placement or disqualification.
7. All exhibits in the Computer Science division must be entered on a USB drive containing all supporting documents as listed below for each class.
 - a. The USB drive should be included in an envelope with the Computer Exhibit Form (found at <http://computers.engtech4ks.com/> or your local extension office) attached to the front.
 - b. The USB drive should be labeled with the 4-H member's name and county.
8. Source code must be included on the USB drive for all computer programming projects coded by the 4-H member. This could include a .txt file, python file, Scratch URL, etc. Failure to include the source code will result in one ribbon deduction.
9. Each exhibit must include written operating instructions including how to locate, run, and use the project. Operating instructions should be printed and placed in the manilla envelope and included digitally on the USB drive.
10. Each exhibit must be accompanied by a typed requirements document included on the USB drive. See [link] for a template that can be used for documenting requirements.
 - a. The requirements for the document should be set up at the beginning of the project. It will include a list of goals and requirements that the 4-H member wants to include or achieve in their final project.
 - b. The project requirements section is formatted as a checklist, with the 4-H member checking off what they accomplished and adjusting throughout their work on the project as needed.
 - c. Flow charts, designs, or other diagrams may be included for computer programs to show the logical flow of the program as needed.
11. For coded computer programs, screenshots of the program will be displayed digitally at the state fair. A display screenshop must be included electronically on the USB drive. For county Page | 53 fairs, it is recommended to print screenshots for display at fairs that don't have electronic displays available.
12. All electric components of micro controlled devices must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure, specifically circuit board. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.

Identified grade Holsteins and DHIA-VIP animals are eligible to show. Other grade animals must have ownership verified by Extension Agent or Vocational Agriculture Instructor.
5. Each breed will be shown separately.
6. All lactating dairy cows may be brought to the fairgrounds, shown, and taken home on the day of the county fair dairy show.
7. Exhibitors are requested to be neatly and appropriately attired (preferably in white) when showing their animals in the ring.
8. All ages of one breed will be shown before advancing on to the next breed.
9. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. Inspection will take place before the animal(s) have been unloaded at the fairgrounds.
10. Cattle determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts, or infested with mange will not be permitted to show.
11. For animals to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animal in a regular class. No animal may be entered into showmanship without also being shown in a regular class.

2. Pre-enter Dairy Goats by June 30.
3. All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified by Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
4. Exhibitors may enter no more than two (2) dairy goats per class with a maximum of eight (8) dairy goats.
5. Enter the animals in the age class for which the age the animal will be on the day of the show.
6. In all classes an exhibitor is the owner of the animal.
7. Exhibitors are requested to be neatly and appropriately attired (preferably in white) when showing their animals in the ring.
8. Crossbred does will be shown in the grade doe classes.
9. For sanitary reasons, all milk stands brought to the fair must be clean and checked in by the superintendent.
10. Horns are allowed on market goats only, not on breeding goats.
11. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. Inspection will take place before the animal(s) have been unloaded at the fairgrounds. Goats determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts, or infested with mange will not be permitted to show.
12. All sexually intact goats (does and bucks) must be identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA premise ID tag. Kids under 8 weeks of age, accompanying their dams, are exempt from identification requirements.
13. For animals to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animal in a regular class. No animal may be entered into showmanship without also being shown in a regular class.
14. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.
15. Leased breeding animals must have a lease ID form signed and on file in the Extension Office by June 15.

Rules

2. Pre-enter Dog entries by June 30.
3. Dogs are not allowed to run at large or accompany owners on fairgrounds before, during, and following a show.
4. All contestants will adhere to the current Kansas 4-H Dog Show Guidelines for general show rules. A list of Obedience Class Descriptions and Requirements is available at the Extension office.
5. The exhibitor must care for, train, and show the dog. Exhibitors may enter only one dog per class.
6. Two 4-H members from the same family may share a dog, but the dog can only be entered in one showmanship class and only one obedience class.
7. Each dog must be trained and shown with a 6-foot leather or nylon leash and a training collar.
8. Any abuse of dogs on the grounds or in the ring will result in disqualification.
9. Dogs should be relieved in the designated area north of the judging arena.
10. No dog in season will be allowed to show.
11. Any dog fouling the ring will receive a white ribbon. Dogs exhibiting extremely aggressive or vicious behavior will be excused from the ring.
12. Baiting dogs is not allowed.
13. Costume - fun class, judged by originality in costume. Exhibitors must compete in Showmanship and/or Obedience class to participate in Costume Class.
14. State 4-H Dog Show Immunization Record (MG-34 Revised, October 2017) must be completed on each dog entered at the 4-H Dog Show. The record may be printed on any color paper. Originals or photocopies are acceptable. The fully completed form must be presented to the superintendent at check-in on the day of the show to be eligible to compete. Required vaccinations include Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus, Parainfluenza, and Rabies. The Rabies vaccination must be administered by a licensed veterinarian. All vaccinations must be current. Dogs must be at least 6 months of age at the time of the show.
15. Good sportsmanship shall always be observed. The judge's decision is final. Poor sportsmanship may lead to loss of ribbon, class dismissal, or disqualification from the show as determined by the judge. Any protest should be made by writing to the Fair Board Rules Committee. Exhibitors, parents, and volunteers are not to approach the judge directly.
16. All exhibitors are required to attend a Dog-Handler Safety class presented by Douglas County.

17. For Showmanship, a show lead that serves as both collar and lead or a fine link chain collar, a “snake” chain, or a fabric slip collar with a narrow, lightweight fabric or leather lead. No spiked, pinch, special training collars, or hanging objects from collars are allowed.
18. Dogs are to be in their kennel when not showing.

Dress attire. No jeans, short skirts, or heels. Closed-toed shoes.

Obedience Attire:

Comfortable and nice attire. Closed-toed shoes.

ELECTRIC & RENEWABLE ENERGY 4-H

Department 180
Superintendent: *Breven Flory*

Through Electric/Electronics or Small Engines, you will have the opportunity to educate others about what youth have learned through the project or to promote the benefits of participation in those project areas.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Refer to schedule of events for entry times.
3. Carefully read the judging sheet for Electric/Electronic projects and be certain that your project meets each, and every one of the judging criteria.
4. Each Electronics & Renewable Energy exhibit must include a "4-H Electronics & Renewable Energy Information Form" which is available through your local K-State Extension Office. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" X 13" manila envelope. You must also include a wiring diagram or schematic. Place them inside the manila envelope. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
5. Exhibitor may enter no more than one article in each class.
6. Articles that have been in use should be cleaned for the exhibit.
7. All electrical exhibits' wiring and connections must be accessible for examination by the judges. Sealed exhibits that cannot be opened for inspection are not acceptable.
8. Lithium batteries must be accessible or removeable in exhibits for safety purposes. The exhibit cannot contain a locked compartment housing a lithium battery.
9. The National Electric Code (NEC) will apply for judging.
10. A sheet of operating instructions must be furnished for any exhibit that is not self-explanatory.
11. Exhibit must be operable. If battery power is required, batteries must be furnished.
12. Any project with a complexity of size or electronics must have (a) instructions for assembly and use and (b) if it requires special test equipment beyond a screwdriver or multimeter, it should be available at the time of judging for actual testing of the exhibit.
13. No hand dipped solder may be used on exhibits.
14. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judge's discretion, may receive a reduced ribbon placement or disqualification.

1801 AC Electric – Electric projects with a 110 or 120 V alternating current (AC) power source. Some project examples are household wiring demonstrations, small appliances extension cords, trouble lights, indoor or outdoor wiring boards, or shop lights. Projects may be a restoration or original construction. The project must be operational and meet minimum safety standards. AC projects must be 110/120 V no 240 V exhibits are allowed and must be constructed such that the judges have wiring access to examine the quality and safety of workmanship.

1802 DC Electric – Electric projects with a battery or direct current power source. This class includes electric kits or original projects. This class also includes demonstration DC powered projects. Examples include wiring two- or three-way switches, difference between series/parallel lighting circuits or wiring doorbells switches. All DC electric projects must include batteries supplied by the 4-H member. Projects must be constructed such that the judges have access to examine the quality of wiring workmanship.

1803 Electronic– Electronic projects with a battery or direct current power source. This class includes electronic kits or original projects. Examples include radios, telephones, toy robots, light meters, security systems, etc. They may be constructed using printed circuit board, wire wrap, or breadboard techniques. Include instruction/assembly manual if the exhibit is from a kit. Include plans if an original project. Projects must be constructed such that the judges have access to examine the quality of wiring workmanship.

1804 Educational Displays and Exhibits – The purpose of the educational display and exhibit is to educate the viewer about a specific area of the 4-H energy management project. The display or exhibit should illustrate one basic idea. This class includes any educational displays, exhibits or science fair type projects such as posters or displays of wire types, conduit types, electrical safety, tool or motor parts identification or electrical terminology.

1805 Newly Built or Repaired Computer - This class is for newly built or repaired computers (laptop or PC) and allows 4-H members to demonstrate skills integrating the various parts of a computer into a single unit. Displays should show either a fully functional computer or show what the individual components do. The display

should be free of dust and cabled neatly. Fully functional computers should boot up and do not need to include a monitor, keyboard, or mouse at the State Fair.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY

(A form of energy derived from a natural source, such as the sun, geothermal, wind, tides, or waves)

All exhibits in this division are limited in size to standard, tri-fold display boards (36" X48") and items may not extend beyond 12" from the back board. All displays must be self-standing.

1808 Educational Display – Create an exhibit that addresses a focused topic related to power generated from a renewable energy source. The purpose of the exhibit is to inform and create awareness.

1809 Experiment – Display an experiment addressing a problem or question related to power generated from a renewable energy source. Include hypothesis, background research, variable, a control, data, findings, conclusions, and recommendations for future study.

ENTOMOLOGY 4-H/FFA

Department 190

Superintendent: *Alica Thomas and Joshua Fortner*

If you've ever chased butterflies, caught a ladybug for a closer look, or planted a pollinator garden, the entomology project may be a great fit. You'll learn the anatomy of insects; the importance of pollinators, make an insect net; and possibly create an insect collection. Later, you'll study how insects move, learn about insecticides, and explore insect behavior.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Refer to schedule of events for entry times.
3. 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging on one (1) entry.
4. All exhibits in this division must be entered at this time.

A 4-H member may exhibit in the ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION, ENTOMOLOGY NOTEBOOK and/or EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY categories. Within each category there are classes in Beginning, Intermediate or Advanced phases in which they enroll. The Notebook category also has an Introductory class that 4-Hers may exhibit in the State Fair if they meet age requirements and County Fair ribbon placing requirements. An Introductory Entomology Collection Class exhibit is encouraged for the county fair (first year members only), but these may not be exhibits at the State Fair. See class descriptions within categories for requirements.

Resources for exhibiting can be found on the Kansas 4-H Entomology project page.

COLLECTION CLASSES

1. All entries should be submitted in an 18 x 24 x 3.5-inch wooden display box with a clear plastic top (such as plexiglass). Boxes can be handmade or purchased as long as they are of the correct size and do not have a glass top. Please visit the website listed above for box instructions and plans.
2. 4-Hers may choose to use one of the two taxonomies:
 - a. As printed in "Insects in Kansas" book or
 - b. As printed on the "Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy", which follows [Bug Guide](#)
3. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box with two identification labels bearing exhibitor's name, county or district, the class and state of taxonomy used. One label goes in the upper left corner of the box (inside) and the other on the lower right corner of the box (outside). Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.

4. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on both exhibitor's box identification labels. Only one adult insect per species can be used in the Collection Boxes Notebook Classes, unless labeled as male or female and correctly identified.
5. Arrange specimens in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box. Specimens are to be arranged by Order in the box, then family where required. For each collection class, two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First (closest to the specimen) is the common name label and the second label should include date/locality.
6. Two labels should be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First (closest to the specimen) is the common name label and the second label should include date/locality. Full County name and state abbreviation should be on the second label. Collector's name (or host) on the date/locality label is optional.
7. The specimens should be collected by the exhibitor and should focus on Kansas insects. Insects may be collected from one county into bordering states and labeled accordingly. Please refer to "Entomology Collection Exhibit Resource" for full details on out-of-State insects in collections.
8. Only specimens of the class Insecta should be included.
9. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.
10. Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, termites, etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials; however, the use of alcohol filled vials should be limited to only those specimens that lose their shape when pinned, since the vials pose a significant hazard to the rest of the collection if they become loose in transit.
11. Any major violation of rules will result in the exhibit being dropped one ribbon placing. Examples would include, but are not limited to: incorrect display box size, missing paperwork, feet on display boxes, no special project in notebooks, etc.
12. After the first year in Entomology, all 4-H members need to add an 8 ½ by 11-inch sheet of paper to their collection that states what they did to improve their collection for the current year. This should include how many new insects were added to the display box (please list), how many insects were replaced in the display box (please list), and Page | 60 number of new orders and/or families were added to the display box. Other optional things that could be included are number of insects caught for the year, number of new Orders added this year, number of talks and/or demonstrations given, activities participated in, leadership roles, etc. This paper should be taped to the upper left corner on the front of your display box.
13. The following insects are listed as Threatened or Endangered by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Because of this, no specimens of the below species may be caught or displayed in insect collections or educational displays. If specimens of these species are included in collections or educational displays, it will be counted as a major violation. Any major violation of rules will result in the exhibit being dropped one ribbon placing. Please refer to www.kanas4-h.org on the Entomology project page for more information.
14. Do not put the spindle-shaped bag of a Bagworm in your collections (as a female example of the species.) These bags must be cut open to determine if the caterpillar inside is a male or female. Opening the box to confirm the ID correctness could pose a significant risk to the collection.

1901 INTORDUCTORY ENTOMOLOGY

Insect collection of a least 6 orders, including 15-30 species to be shown in 1 regular entomology size box or 2 small entomology boxes and grouped according to order. Insect names are not necessary on individual specimens, but date/locality labels are required (No State Fair class).

1902 BEGINNING I ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION

Display in one standard box a minimum of 50 and maximum of 125 species representing at least 7 orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first and then they are moved up a division.

1903 BEGINNING II ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION

Display in one standard box a minimum of 75 and maximum of 150 species representing at least 9 orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first and then they are oved up a division.

1904 INTERMEDIATE ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION

Display a minimum of 100 and a maximum of 300 species representing at least 10 orders. Two standard boxes can be used. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. In addition, family identification is required for all insects in any two of the following six orders: (Only two will be counted for judging)

- a) "Insects In Kansas" book - Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Homoptera, Coleoptera, Hymenoptera, and/or Diptera or
- b) Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy", which follows www.bugguide.net – Odonata, Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Coleoptera, Hymenoptera, and/or Diptera

Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years. A 4-H member must move up if they receive a purple ribbon at the Kansas State Fair.

1905 ADVANCED ENTOMOLOGY COLLECTION

Display a minimum of 150 and a maximum of 450 species representing at least 12 orders. Three standard boxes can be used. Follow the general guidelines listed for Collections. Family identification is required for all insects belonging to the six basic orders as outlined under the Intermediate phase. Only families in the above six orders will be counted for judging. Family identification of insects in the remaining orders is optional, but desirable as long as accuracy is maintained. Members may continue to exhibit in this class at the Kansas State Fair for an unrestricted number of years if they remain eligible for 4 H membership.

NOTEBOOK CLASSES

General Guidelines

1. Individual entries are to be placed for display in a three-ring notebook for competition.
2. For the Intermediate and Advanced level, two notebooks may be used. A Title Page must be placed in the front of the second notebook.
3. 4-Hers may choose to use one of two taxonomies:
 - a. as printed in "Insects in Kansas" book or
 - b. as printed on the "Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy", which follows www.bugguide.net.
3. 4-H'ers who have been previously enrolled in or are currently enrolled in the other phases of the Entomology project need to start with the Beginning Phase of Entomology Notebooks, not the Introductory phase.
4. Each exhibitor is required to identify the notebook by placing a Title Page in the front of the notebook bearing the exhibitor's name, county or district and class 4-H'er is enrolled in and statement of taxonomy used:
 - a. "Insects in Kansas" book or
 - b. [Bug Guide](#)The number of orders, specimens, and families (required in Intermediate and Advanced classes) must also be included on the Title page.
5. Specimen pages should be grouped according to order and should include one page per species. If more than one insect is in the photo, an arrow to indicate the identified insect should be used.
6. Date, common name, full county name, state abbreviation, and collector name should be included for each species. The collector's name on the specimen page is optional
7. Specimen pages should have two different views of the insect if possible. If pictures are taken on different dates/localities, include information for both.
8. A statement describing the habitat where found/host plant may be included and is encouraged and will be worth a bonus 10 points total, not per page. For Intermediate and advanced notebooks, this is strongly encouraged.
9. For the Intermediate and Advanced classes, insects are also to be grouped by family behind each order divider.
10. A divider page is to be placed in front of each order of insects with the order name printed on the tab for the page and on the front of the divider page.
11. After the first year in Entomology, all 4-H members need to add an 8 ½ by 11-inch sheet of paper to their Photo Collection Notebook that states what they did to improve their notebook for the current year. This should include how many new insect photo pages were added to the Notebook (please list), how many insect photo pages were replaced in the Notebook (please list), and number of new orders and/or families added to the Notebook. Other optional things that could include are number of insects photographed for the year, number of new Orders added this year, number of talks and/or demonstrations given, activities

participated in, leadership roles, etc. This paper should be placed right behind the Title Page in your Notebook.

12. A special project must be completed each year and included in the notebook. See project guideline materials for specifications.
13. Refer to the publication "Entomology Collection Notebook Guidelines" on the Kansas 4-H Entomology web page for more detailed rules for exhibiting.
14. Any major violation of rules will result in the exhibit being dropped one ribbon placing. Examples would include, but are not limited to, incorrect photo size, missing paperwork, no special project in notebooks, etc.
15. A minimum of 10 phot pages of new species must be added and/or replaced each year.

1906 BEGINNING I ENTOMOLOGY NOTEBOOK

Display a minimum of 20 and a maximum of 50 insect species representing at least six different orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for Notebooks, including the Special Project. A 4-H'er may exhibit in this class for a maximum of two years.

1907 BEGINNING II ENTOMOLOGY NOTEBOOK

Display a minimum of 40 and a maximum of 70 insect species representing at least seven different orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for all Notebooks, including the Special Project. A 4-H'er may exhibit in this class for a maximum of three years or until they receive a purple ribbon, whichever comes first.

1908 INTERMEDIATE ENTOMOLOGY NOTEBOOK

Display a minimum of 60 and a maximum of 100 species representing at least 9 orders. Follow the general guidelines listed for Notebooks, including the Special Project. In addition, family identification is required for all insects in any two of the following six orders: (Only two will be counted for judging)

"Insects in Kansas" – Orthopters, Hemipters, Homopteran, Coleoptera, Hymenoptera, and/or Diptera or

"Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy" which follows www.bugguide.net – Odonata, Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Coleoptera, Hymenoptera, and/or Diptera.

A 4-H'er may exhibit in this class for a maximum of three years. A 4-H member must move up if they receive a purple ribbon.

1909 ADVANCED ENTOMOLOGY NOTEBOOK

Display a minimum of 100 and a maximum of 200 species representing at least 12 orders. Follow the general rules listed for Notebooks, including the special Project. Follow the general guidelines listed for notebooks. Family identification is required for all insects belonging to the six basic orders as outlined under the Intermediate phase. Only families in the above six orders will be counted for judging. Family identification of insects in the remaining orders is optional, but desirable if accuracy is maintained. Members may continue to exhibit in this class for an unrestricted number of years if they remain eligible for 4-H membership.

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY CLASSES

General Guidelines

1. Share with others what you have learned in this project. Exhibit any activity or learning experience related to the field of entomology or the Teaming with Insects curriculum that does not fit into Entomology Collection or notebook classes above.
2. Follow Copyright laws as explained in the General Rules.
3. The exhibit may be, but isn't limited to, original works, digital presentations (must provide printed hardcopy for exhibit purposes for the duration of the fair), programs, websites, games, apps, display box, notebook, display or poster which you have made.
4. If the exhibit is a wooden display box, it must be 18 x 24 x 3.5 inches with a clear plastic top (such as plexiglass) and displayed horizontally. If the exhibit is a poster, it must not be larger than 22" x 28". If the exhibit is a display, maximum size is not to exceed a standard commercial 3' x 4' tri-fold display board.
5. Name and county/district must clearly be marked on educational exhibits.
6. Refer to Entomology General Rule 14 for information on Threatened and Endangered Species specimens that cannot be displayed in Educational Exhibits.
7. Any major violation of rules will result in the exhibit being dropped one ribbon placing. Examples would include, but are not limited to: incorrect display box size, missing paperwork, feet on display boxes, no reference for information and/or photos, etc.

1910 BEGINNING EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

Class for individuals that are exhibiting the Beginning I and II Collection or Beginning Notebook Classes. Follow the general rules listed for Educational Displays.

1911 INTERMEDIATE EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

Class for individuals that are exhibiting in the Intermediate Collection or Intermediate Notebook Classes. If only exhibiting in this category, then ages 11-14

1912 ADVANCED EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

MONARCH BUTTERFLY EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY CLASSES

General Guidelines

1. Exhibits should teach the public about the Monarch Butterfly and/or ways to protect and conserve it. The information could show nectar sources for adult butterflies and food sources for caterpillars, Monarch tagging activities, collection of native milkweed and then packaging it to give to others to plant, a group working together to plant a Monarch friendly garden, etc.
2. 4-H members may create a poster, notebook, standard size trifold, diorama, slide show, or other visual display that shows information on Monarch Butterflies.
3. If a slide show is created, it should be presented on a zip drive along with a printed copy of the presentation.

Fiber arts is defined as the practical skills passed down from preceding generations that were developed to provide basic family needs, such as apparel, home furnishings or decorations.

NOTE: Fiber Arts include Crochet, Knitting, Needle Arts, Patchwork, Quilting, Rug Making, Spinning, Weaving, Ethnic Arts and Macramé.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30. Exhibitor must be enrolled in Heritage Fiber Arts
2. Identification labels should be a 2 ½ x 3-inch piece of cloth on which you type or print class number, county, and name. Sew or safety pin labels on. Label each piece.
3. An exhibitor may enter up to 4 entries per class.
4. When articles which are normally worn as a pair are exhibited, both articles must be shown together. Fasten articles together securely with yarn.
5. The exhibitor may attach an index card, no larger than 3" x 5", with the entry form to give the judge any information which the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know. Explain whether you created the fabric for a knitted article by hand or by a knitting machine. Explain if the article is an original design.
6. When the exhibit is a sewed garment that also includes one or more Heritage Fiber Art techniques (i.e., knitting, crochet, needle arts, or patch work and quilting), the determination of what division (Clothing or Fiber

Arts) and class in which to enter will be left with the 4-H participant. For quilted items indicate who did the quilting and binding.

7. All exhibits which need to be hung MUST have the appropriate hanger, rod, wire, or other mechanism attached in order to be properly displayed.
8. 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging on one (1) entry. All exhibits in this division must be entered at this time
9. This division is eligible for State Fair exhibit if the entry receives a purple ribbon, and the exhibitor meets the age requirements.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Project enrollment under Horticulture.
2. Refer to schedule of events for entry times.
3. 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging on one (1) entry. All exhibits in this division must be entered at this time.
4. Exhibits shall be made from flowers grown and collected by the exhibitor rather than purchased by the exhibitor. Houseplants must be cared for by the exhibitor for a minimum of 6 months.
5. Cut flower entries should be in clear, colorless containers sized in proportion to the specimen.
6. Exhibitor limited to a total of 8 entries with no more than 2 entries per class.
7. Arrangements should not take over one square foot of table space.
8. Flower arrangements shall be made from materials and flowers grown and collected by the exhibitor. Arrangements can be made from fresh or dried flowers.
9. Exhibits will be placed in the Danish system. Just for Fun classes will not be eligible for Champion Cut Flower or Champion Flower Arrangement or Grand Champions.
10. All entries must be freestanding, easily moved, and not require any special equipment to display. Hanging entries are not accepted.

FOOD AND NUTRITION 4-H

In this project, you will have fun learning how to cook the basics and then advance to gourmet and international meals. Develop baking skills, learn about food preservation, explore the heritage of many foods, and understand consumer buying skills. Learn how to make healthy snacks and modify recipes to fit a healthy lifestyle.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30. Judging of all 4-H Food entries (classes 210 A 21001 to 210 D 21036) takes place at entry time. Refer to the schedule of events for entry dates and times.
2. COPIES OF THE COMPLETE RECIPES WITH INGREDIENTS AND INSTRUCTIONS ARE REQUIRED FOR ALL NON-PERISHABLE FOOD PRODUCTS, FOOD GIFT PACKAGES, AND 100% WHOLE GRAIN NON-PERISHABLE FOOD PRODUCTS OR THE PLACING WILL BE LOWERED ONE RIBBON WHEN JUDGED. ATTACH THE RECIPE TO THE OUTSIDE OF THE WRAPPED EXHIBIT. The recipe will not be returned.
3. For food safety purposes, any entries with frostings and fillings must only calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe. The calculation must be attached to the entry, or the placing will be lowered a ribbon when judged. Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. Examples of how to calculate this percentage are included in the publication located at:
<https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/MF3544.pdf>.
A worksheet is available at: https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/item/frostings-and-fillings-worksheet_4H1171
Recipes containing ganache are not allowed.
4. For food safety purposes, any food with cream cheese, custard or dairy-based fillings and frostings (ex., Cream cheese regardless of sugar content), raw eggs, flavored oils, "canned" bread or cakes in a jar, cut fresh fruit or any food requiring refrigeration (ex. Bacon) or unbaked exhibit with raw flour will be disqualified and not judged.
5. Fair officials reserve the right to hold any food preparation exhibits to be used in the exhibition. Other exhibits in this division, except the food gift packages, will be priced and sold after judging. (See Food Sale in this division.) One piece or one part of these food exhibits will be kept for display.
6. 4-H exhibitors (individual or group) should avoid using copyrighted materials whenever possible by originating his/her own work. Copyrighted and/or trademarked materials utilized in banners, displays, demonstrations,

- posters, or other activities for endorsement or promotion instead of educational purposes will be disqualified and will not be displayed or receive ribbons or premiums.
7. Alcohol (ex., Wine, beer, and hard liquor) is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and will not be judged.
 8. All baked goods must be left whole and uncut. Small items, such as cookies and rolls, should be the same shape and from the same recipe. Exhibit 3 cookies, 3 muffins, 3 breadsticks, 1 loaf of bread, etc.
 9. Under-baked entries will be lowered by one or more ribbon placings.
 10. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with top crust showing when it comes out of the oven, except for those cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes. They should have top crust side down.
 11. Attach the label to the bottom of the plate or cardboard. Labels are available at the Douglas County Extension Office, or templates are available at http://www.kansas4-h.org/events-activities/fairs/Kansas-state-fair/docs/foods-and-nutrition/Foods_Label.pdf or make you own with the following information: Class Number, Foods Product Name, 4-H member's Name, and County.
 12. Any baked product that can be removed from the pan should be placed on paper plates or covered cardboard cut to fit the size of the exhibit; otherwise, exhibit in a disposable container. Fruit and pecan pies may be exhibited in a disposable or donated regular bakeware pie plate. Since space is limited, use small paper plates when possible. Only the exhibit is judged; the container is not judged.
 13. All exhibits must be in FOOD GRADE PLASTIC BAGS OR PLACED IN A PLASTIC DISPOSABLE CONTAINER. (Plastic containers can be purchased in the bakery department at local supermarkets.)
 14. Attach the entry form, recipe, and evaluation form to the outside of the wrapped exhibit. Do not wrap forms in plastic.
 15. The exhibitor is encouraged to attach a 3 x 5-inch index card with the entry form in all food classes to give the judge any information that the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know.
 16. A Decorated Food Item (i.e. decorated cake), a Specialty Food Product, or a Group Educational Exhibit will no longer be accepted for exhibit at the State Fair; therefore, to be consistent with state fair rules, they will no longer be accepted for exhibit in the 4-H Division at the Douglas County Fair.
 17. Ready-to-eat or bake'n-serve cakes, pies, cookies, muffins, etc. are unacceptable. Food item needs to be prepared and/or assembled by the 4-H'er. A master mix (i.e. gifts in a jar, soup mix, etc.) is not considered a nonperishable food product. They are acceptable only as part of a Food Gift Package.
 18. Judging criteria will be based on taste (50 points), overall appearance, and creativity (25 points each)
 19. 4-H'ers are encouraged to use whole grain flour, fruits, nuts, etc.
 20. No duplicate samples shall be taken from the same baking or batch and be shown by the same and/or different people as their respective products.

Non-Perishable Food Product – any non-perishable food product may be entered. For food safety purposes, any food with custard and dairy-based fillings and frostings (ex. Cream cheese), raw eggs, flavored oils, “canned” bread, or cakes in a jar, cut fresh fruit or any food requiring refrigeration (ex. Bacon) or unbaked exhibit with raw flour will be disqualified and not be judged. Dried foods (i.e., apple chips, fruit leather, etc.) should be exhibited in Food Preservation. Refer to K-State Research and Extension publication, 4-H488, Judge’s Guide for Food and Nutrition Exhibits, <https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/4H488>, and MF3544, Food Safety for Frostings and Fillings https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/item/frostings-and-fillings-worksheet_4H1171 for information to help you make informed, safe food exhibit decisions.

Food Gift Package - is considered a non-perishable food product, not an educational exhibit. A food gift package must contain at least 3 different non-perishable food items (prepared for human consumption), made by the 4-H'er, in a suitable container no larger than 18" x 18" x 18". Prepared food items must have recipes attached with the entry. Additional homemade food items beyond the 3 minimum or purchased items may also be included in the gift basket. On a 3" x 5" card, answer these questions: a) what the intended use is; b) what food safety precautions were taken during and after preparation. Home canned foods must follow Food Preservation rules. Canning jars should not be used for baking per the manufacturer's instructions. They could break during baking. No alcoholic beverages will be accepted. Any brand name products in the basket must have the labels covered. Do not cellophane wrap your basket. All items in the gift basket must be non-perishable and if they have frosting or glaze, you must include the sugar percentage worksheet.

Educational Exhibit - Educational exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook, or display (see explanations below). No card table displays are allowed. Take care to select materials that will withstand fair conditions. Exhibitor name and county must be clearly marked on all educational exhibits. The exhibitor may attach an index card, no larger than 3 x 5 inches, with the entry form to give the judge any information that the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know. NOTE: A collection of your favorite recipes in a recipe box does not constitute an educational exhibit.

Poster - no larger than 22 x 28 inches

Notebook - can be a 3-ring, spiral, folder, etc.

Display – Displays are not to exceed a standard commercial 3' x 4' tri-fold display board.

Place Setting - a place setting for one, no larger than 4 square feet, excluding the centerpiece and menu. Anything larger than 4 square feet will be lowered by one ribbon placing. Include place setting and menu for a well-balanced meal or snack. Must be consultation judged. The 4-H'er will check in during 4-H Foods check-in and sign up for consultation judging. The 4-H'er will then set up the place setting so it is ready for consultation judging. Place setting cannot be exhibited at the State Fair.

FOOD PRESERVATION 4-H

Department 220

Superintendents: *Margaret Kalb, Carol Taul, and Doni Mooberry-Slough*

In this project, you will learn the techniques used to preserve food by slowing or preventing spoilage. These practices help maintain the food's quality, safety, and nutritional value over time. You'll gain hands-on experience with several preservation methods, including pressure canning, water bath canning, and dehydrating, focusing on safely preserving fruits, vegetables, and meats.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to participate in consultation judging. Exhibitors will sign up for a consultation judging during judging on Monday of the fair.
3. No frozen food may be exhibited.
4. Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and will not be judged.
5. There are no safe recommendations to can white peaches or elderberries.
6. Exhibits must have been preserved since the previous year's county fair and not been exhibited at the previous State Fair.
7. A 4-H member may exhibit up to two entries per numbered class. (The two entries must be different.) The first six numbered classes require one jar for each class. Dried Foods - one kind of dried food product exhibited in a small canning jar. Suggested amount: 1/3-1/2 cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit. If a dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered by one ribbon rating.
8. EACH EXHIBIT MUST HAVE THE COMPLETE RECIPE AND INSTRUCTIONS ATTACHED, OR IT WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. The recipe must include the exhibitor name, recipe source, date of publication, and elevation of residence where processed. If using Mrs. Wages or Ball® mixes, indicate the date the mix was purchased.
9. Recipes and processing methods from the sources below are required. Recipes must be from current, tested resources listed below and must be adjusted for elevation based on your processing location, or it will be disqualified. Processing methods that will be disqualified include open kettle canning, oven canning, sun canning, and using electric multi-cookers. **If using the Presto Precise ® Digital Pressure Canner, please indicate the appliance is used for either water bath or pressure canning.** For more information on electric multi-cookers, see http://nchfp.uga.edu/publications/nchfp/factsheets/electric_cookers.html. Homemade recipes or other untested recipes will be disqualified for safety reasons. Tested recipe resources include:

10. All dried products must include the recipe and preparation steps. If dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered one ribbon rating. Suggested amount: 1/3 – ½ cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit. All meat jerky must be heated to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F before or after drying. This is not the drying temperature! Dried products must include the recipe, preparation steps and heating instructions. All meat jerky must be heated to 160 degrees F before or after drying. This is not the drying temperature! Jerky not heated to an internal temperature o 160 degrees F will be disqualified and not be judged. Heating information can be found in “Dry Meat Safely at Home” [JERKY INFO](#).
 11. Exhibits must be heat processed in clean, clear standard canning jars, with new matching brand (ex: use Ball® lids on Ball® jars) two-piece lids. This includes fermented foods. Do not use colored jars, fancy padded lids, fabric over wraps or cozies as they interfere with the judging process. Do not reuse jars from commercial food products (ex: spaghetti sauce jars). No fancy packs unless recipe states to do so (ex: Pickled asparagus). Jars must be sealed when entered. For food safety reasons, the size of jars used must not be larger than the jar size stated in the recipe (ex. Salsa is canned in pint jars only, no quarts). Note: There are 12-ounce, 24-ounce, and 28-ounce canning jars available and may be used. Use pint jar process recommendations for 12-ounce jars. Use quart jar process recommendations for 24-ounce jars and 28-ounce jars.
 12. Each jar exhibited must be labeled with a uniform label available from the Douglas County Extension Office. Place the label one inch from the base of jar. Label must not cover brand name of jar. The label must give: Class Number, Product, Elevation where processed, Canning Method (water bath, weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), Process Time, Pressure (psi), Date processed including month and year. Name and County. Templates to make labels can be found here: [LABEL TEMPLATES](#).
 13. Hole punch the entry card and use a rubber band to attach the entry card and recipe around the top of the jar.
 14. Champion and Reserve Champion exhibits will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
 15. A 4-H member may enter up to two exhibits, but may make only one entry per class, in the Food Preservation Division for the Kansas State Fair.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Refer to schedule of events for entry times. Consultation judging offered at entry time.
3. All exhibits must be mounted on 8 1/2" x 11" heavy stock paper and placed in loose leaf binders. (Magnetic or adhesive filler sheets for photographic prints or sheet protectors are recommended.) Twigs and fruit collections may be exhibited in whatever manner you choose. Maximum tri fold size is 3' x 4'. Resources for exhibiting are located on the Kansas 4-H forestry project page: [KANSAS FORESTRY](#)
4. Name, club, age, and year in project should be on front cover or in a prominent location.
5. Leaves should be identified with an appropriate label located near the leaf on the same page. These labels should include (1) the proper common name as listed in the publication 4-H334. "List of Native Kansas Forest Trees" (<https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/4H334.pdf>) (2) Scientific Name (Optional in 2025 and required in 2026) (3) Location (city and or county) where collected; and (4) date (day, month, year) or (month, day, year) collected. Divide specimens into the following two sections: Native Kansas Trees and Non-Native Trees
6. For ideas on mounting, see the Forestry Project booklet (4-H 279).
7. Junior Forester - exhibit only in phases(s) enrolled.
8. Senior Forester enrolled in Self-Determined can enroll in Senior Forester Division at the State Fair.
9. New specimens are those specimens collected during the current 4-H year.
10. Group specimens according to the years collected (such as "old-previous years" and "new").
11. Variations of varieties do not count as different species or specimens.

JUNIOR 4-H FORESTER

231 Beginning - (Choose either A or B), 1st & 2nd year in the project.

A. Exhibit a minimum of 10 different leaves from native Kansas Trees collected within the year. The exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

B. Exhibit a minimum of 5 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig and fruit from each species collected.

232 Intermediate - (Choose either A or B), 3rd & 4th year in the project.

Exhibit a minimum of 20 different leaves (including 10 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. The exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

B. Exhibit a minimum of 10 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new leaf, twig and fruit specimens.

233 Senior - (Choose either A or B), 5th & 6th year in the project.

A. Exhibit a minimum of 30 different leaves (including 10 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. The exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

B. Exhibit a minimum of 15 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new leaf, twig, and fruit specimens.

234 Advanced - (Choose either A or B), over 6 years in the project.

A. Exhibit a minimum of 40 different leaves (including 20 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. The exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

B. Exhibit a minimum of 20 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig and fruit from each species collected. The exhibit must include 10 new leaf, twig, and fruit specimens.

Anyone Enrolled in Forestry:

235 How A Tree Grows

Display - Entry may include project notebook with 10 or more seeds collected with pictures showing germination study or a mounting of a thin section of wood cut from the end of a log or top of stump labeled with information such as kind of wood and age of tree when cut or exhibit an illustration of a how a tree grows.

236 Tree Appreciation

Display - Entry may include research or reporting notebook with no more than 10 pages based on the exhibitor's selected tree. This notebook may include sketches, drawings, pictures, a story, or any other things which will help tell about the tree you have selected. Junior Forestry Record (P-1089) is the reference manual for this project.

237 Educational/Creative Exhibit

Exhibits must be directly related to tree identification or Forestry. The type of exhibit is open (notebook, poster, collection box, etc.) given a maximum size of trifold is 3' x 4'. This is a good class to exhibit an unusual collection. Not a State Fair Class

SENIOR 4-H FORESTER

238 Growing and Protecting Trees

Display requires a project notebook talking about project and pictures before, during, and after planting seedlings. Maximum tri-fold size is 3' x 4'.

239 Tree Culture

Display requires a project notebook showing your project work and includes pictures before, during and after wood lot improvement. Maximum tri-fold size is 3' x 4'.

240 How Forests Serve Us

Display collected wood samples (all or partial) and 500-word essay. Wood sample display to be mounted on poster board or any stiff material no larger than 3' wide x 4' high. Essay should be displayed in a covered binder.

241 Educational/Creative Exhibit

Exhibits must be directly related to tree identification or Forestry. The type of exhibit is open (notebook, poster, collection box, etc.) given a maximum size of trifold 3' x 4'. This is a good class to exhibit an unusual collection.

GEOLOGY 4-H

Department 240

Superintendent: *Alicia Thomas and Joshua Fortner*

In this project, you will learn the difference between rocks and minerals, learn how to identify fossils, describe, and identify rocks, understand stages of the rock cycle, and use the scientific method to solve problems.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Consultation Judging offered during entry time. Refer to main schedule for times.
3. Exhibit box's outside dimensions should be 18 x 24 x 3 1/2 inches. Plexiglas covers are required at State Fair. IF A BOX HAS A SLIDING Plexiglas cover, IT MUST be removable from the top. Screws, locks, or other devices that would prevent judges from removing glass covers should not be used. Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county, and number of specimens in the upper left-hand corner of the Plexiglas and attaching a label with the same information to the back of the box (outside). The inside label is to also indicate the class number.
4. Exhibitor may enter in both geology and lapidary classes. Exhibitors may show in only one of the first four geology classes 2401, 2402, 2403, 2404. Exhibitors may also show one exhibit in geology class 2405 or 24006 special exhibit and one exhibit in lapidary.
5. Geology specimens should be labeled with the number of specimens, date collected, specimen name or description, and locality (county only) where collected.
6. All specimens must be collected in the state of Kansas (only exception-see #7). New specimens must be collected during the current 4-H year, which will be allowed starting on the day after the conclusion of the State Fair.

6. For the geology classes 2401, 2402, 2403, and 2404 specimens should be mounted in the box by proper groups: rocks, minerals, fossils. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum, Class, and Genus level. Genus name is to begin with a capital letter. Species name is all lower case. Genus and species name must either be italicized or underlined, not both. The words "phylum, class genus" on labels are to fully be spelled out, not abbreviated. More than one specimen of the same kind of rock or mineral or species of fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents different geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction (Fort Hayes limestone, not just limestone; calcite from the Greenhorn Formation, not just calcite; Phylum; Brachiopoda Class; Araticuata Genus: Composita from the Morrill Limestone Member, not just Phylum: Brachiopoda Class: Aarticulata Genus: Composita).
7. For geology classes 2401, 2402, 2403, 2404, all specimens must be collected from locations in Kansas, except for Tri-State Mining Area specimens collected from these three adjacent counties: Ottawa County, OK; Newton and Jasper Counties, Mo. Out-of-State specimens will not count in the minimum number for the class, nor will they be considered in the judging.
8. 4-H members enrolled in Geology project 462 Intermediate phase are encouraged to exhibit in class 24009 Special Exhibit as well as class 24007 or 24008 to fulfill project completion requirements.

2401 Geology - Display at least 5 rocks, 5 minerals, and 5 fossils collected during the current 4-H year. Limited to one exhibit box 18 x 24 x 3 1/2 inches with Plexiglas cover. This class is open to those exhibiting at Douglas County Fair until you display at the Kansas State Fair.

2402 Geology - Display at least 30 rocks, minerals, and fossils, at least 5 of each. Fifteen must be collected during the current 4-H year. Limited to one exhibit box 18 x 24 x 3 1/2 inches with Plexiglas cover. This class is open to those exhibiting either first or second time at the Douglas County Fair. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum level.

2403 Geology - Display at least 45 rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. More than one specimen of the same kind of rock or mineral or species of fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents different geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction. (Fort Hays member limestone not just limestone; exact species must have different formation names listed on the I.D. card; Composita Brachiopod from Morrill Limestone member not just Brachiopod or Composita Brachiopod). Exhibit limited to two boxes 18 x 24 x 3 1/2 inches with Plexiglas cover. The exhibit must include approximately 15 specimens of the current year's work. Rocks must be identified by their proper name and type. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum level. These rock types must be spelled out on labels or have a legible key. This class is open to those exhibiting either the third or fourth time at the Douglas County Fair.

2404 Geology - Display at least 60 rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. More than one specimen of the same kind of rock or mineral or species of fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents different geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction (Fort Hays member limestone not just limestone; exact species must have different formation names listed on the I.D. card; Composita Brachiopod from Morrill Limestone members not just Brachiopod or Composita Brachiopod). Exhibit limited to two boxes 18 x 24 x 3 1/2 inches with Plexiglas cover. The exhibit must include approximately 15 specimens of the current year's work. Rocks must be identified by their proper name and type. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum, Class, and Genus levels if possible. These rock types must be spelled out on labels or have a legible key. This class is open to those exhibiting for the fifth time or more at the Douglas County Fair.

Educational or Special Exhibit

2405 Special exhibit relating to everyday living; or to a mineral test, a rock formation, geological history, species of a fossil, forms of one mineral, a variation of one kind of rock, archaeological artifacts, or Native American artifacts. Digital formats are accepted. Exhibit limited to 4 feet of table space. Notebooks should be included.

2406 Mineralogy. Display a minimum of 15 mineral specimens collected in Kansas, at least 5 of which have been collected during the current 4-H year. The minerals are to be grouped by mineral class (i.e.: Carbonates, Oxides, Silicates) and at least 3 classes must be represented. Members must use one standard display box. The specimens must be labeled with the number of the specimen, date collected, name of specimen, county where collected and chemical composition (i.e., CaCO₃ for calcite) if known.

Lapidary - Lapidary will be judged on the following criteria: Workmanship and Content -60 points; Presentation and Showmanship - 30 points and Accuracy of Information - 10 points. The outside dimensions of the display box should be appropriate for display but should not exceed 18" x 24" x 3 1/2". Specimens should be arranged across the 18-inch dimension of the exhibit box, making the exhibit 18 inches across the top and 12 inches deep.

2407 Lapidary. Display at least 5 varieties of polished (tumbled) specimens and 5 varieties of unpolished specimens that have not yet received lapidary treatment. These do not have to be an example of "before and

after”, nor do they have to be self-collected. Locales must be identified. Only those exhibiting lapidary at the State Fair for the first time may exhibit in this class.

2408 Lapidary. Display before-and-after examples of at least 3 varieties of specimens, at least 2 tumble-polished and 2 unpolished of each. There is no requirement that the 4-H'er collect any of these. Locales must be identified. Lapidary work should be done during the current 4-H year.

2409 Lapidary Display before-and-after examples of at least 6 varieties of specimens, at least 2 tumble-polished and 2 unpolished of each. At least two varieties should be collected from the native site by the 4-H'er, at least one of which comes from Kansas. Locales must be identified. Lapidary work on at least three varieties should be done during the current 4-H year.

2410 Lapidary. Display before-and-after examples of at least 9 varieties of specimens, at least 2 tumble-polished and 2 unpolished of each. At least three varieties should be collected from the native site by the 4-H'er, at least two of which come from Kansas. Locales must be identified. Lapidary work on at least three varieties should be done during the current 4-H year.

2411 Lapidary. Exhibit at least 6 specimens that have not previously been exhibited, which have received lapidary treatment. Lapidary treatment may consist of polishing, and end, face, or flat lapping. Specimens must represent at least 3 different varieties and include at least three cabochons of any size or shape, only one of which may be free formed. A cabochon is a style of cutting in which the top of the stone forms a domed or curved convex surface. Three of the specimens must be mounted into jewelry findings.

HORSE/MULE 4-H/FFA

Department 60

Superintendents: *Bobbie Hinds*

Rules

1. Read General Rules.
2. The parking area for trailers will be north of the community building in the grass area and not along the road. No horse exhibits are allowed on the grounds before 6 a.m. on show day. The check-in time for the show will be from 8:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. Exercising may be performed in the grassy area north of the community building. Horses, under no circumstances, are allowed to be tied to the arena fencing.
3. All class entries must be made by June 30. Exhibitors may drop classes on the day of the show by alerting show officials at check-in or with show personnel during the show.
4. Walk-trot classes are intended for novice riders who are not comfortable loping their horses in a show setting. Exhibitors may not cross-enter loping and walk-trot classes. Exhibitors in the Walk-trot Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, and Flag Race will receive a white ribbon if, by the judge's decision, they lope for more than two strides once they cross the timeline to begin their class. The Pleasure Pairs class will be judged as a walk-trot class and will not affect exhibitors entering loping classes.
5. All equines must have a 4-H Horse ID form and pictures submitted to the Extension Office by the official deadline set by the Extension Office on June 1st. Brothers and/or sisters may show the same horse/pony/mule, provided they are not in the same class and they are both listed on the horse's I.D. See the Kansas 4-H Horse Show Rule Book for more information regarding leases, etc. Exhibitors must show their 4-H Horse ID form copy to the Superintendent during check-in on the day of the show. All members exhibiting must complete the Kansas 4-H Equine Webinar Safety Episode, with a quiz annually, before completing. It must be completed by June 2nd. Exhibitors can contact the Extension Office for details on how to watch and complete the test.
6. Health Requirements- Horses, ponies, and mules should be free of infections and contagious diseases. The horse show committee reserves the right to turn a horse away if they feel the animal is not healthy. All exhibits in the 4-H Horse Show must present proof of the negative Coggins test within the last 12 months at check-in.
7. The Fair Board and horse show committee reserve the right to cancel or postpone any or all classes due to inclement weather, the right to combine classes based on pre-entries, the right to modify the dress code due to weather conditions, and the right to excuse unruly animals from any class.

8. All 4-H contestants will adhere to the current Kansas 4-H Horse Show Rule Book of regulations of general show rules, English class rules, and Western class rules unless otherwise specified within these rules (found online at [KANSAS HORSE PROJECT](#)).
9. All contestants, family members, and spectators are expected to always display proper conduct and courtesy. Unsportsmanlike conduct by the 4-H'er or those people accompanying the 4-H'er will not be tolerated. Such actions will result in forfeiture of all placings and qualifications earned during the show, and those involved may be excused from the grounds at the discretion of show management. Grievances must be made in writing and submitted to the Rules Committee within two (2) hours after the incident. JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL. Separate judges will judge the 4-H Show and Open Show.
10. Only current 4-H members are allowed to ride 4-H horses/ponies/mules on the grounds of a 4-H show. There is to be no bareback or double riding on the grounds. Parents, legal guardians, grandparents, siblings, and/or a fellow 4-H member are allowed to assist the 4H'er with their horse. Adults other than show officials are barred from the show ring while the 4-H horses are being judged.
11. Each exhibitor will be issued two contestant identification numbers. During halter classes, the number will be secured to the exhibitor's back; during riding classes, a number will be secured on each side of the saddle on the saddle pad.
12. Maximum time for tack change - 5 minutes. Please keep the ring steward or gate help informed of tack changes.
13. Any horse 56 inches and under (without shoes) is considered a pony. Ponies may be measured at check-in if height is in question. An exhibitor may enter both the pony and western pleasure, but they may NOT enter the same animal in more than one pleasure class.
14. Ranch Riding will be a pattern-only class; rail work will not be performed.
15. In all trail classes, 4-H members are allowed 60 seconds to maneuver the gate and 30 seconds to maneuver other obstacles. Exhibitors must maneuver the gate unassisted. The judge has the right to motion an exhibitor onto the next obstacle if not begun in 30 seconds and the exhibitor will be penalized accordingly.
16. The in-hand trail class is intended for Miniature Horses, smaller ponies, non-riding exhibitors, or two-year-old horses. Horses shown in the In-hand Trail class may not be ridden in any class by the in-hand trail exhibitor (Ex: exhibitor shows a Miniature Horse in In-hand Trail and rides a horse in the Trail or Ranch Trail class). Exceptions may be made for a non-riding sibling to show a horse ridden by a sibling in other classes.
17. Time and safety should be considered when entering the arena for timed events. Dismissal from the class due to safety concerns or excessive time entering is at the discretion of the judge. The horse must enter the arena; the gate must be closed before starting the run. The gate must remain closed until the runner stops. For safety reasons, horses must enter under the control of a mounted rider. The horse cannot be led into the arena by an unmounted or mounted person. The rider must also have the horse under control before exiting the arena.
18. For English classes, exhibitors may ride Hunter or Saddle Seat style.
19. Exhibitor levels and ages are: Level III, age 15-18; Level II, age 11-14; Level I, age 7-10.
20. An exhibitor may enter up to two equines in a halter class; the second equine must be shown by another exhibitor entered in the show. Equine may be shown in only one halter class. This excludes showmanship.
21. The first and second-place exhibitors in each halter class will be called back to judge the overall grand champion and reserve grand champion halter horse.

Horse Age:

Horse Age – Horses/mules/donkeys must be at least 2 years old to show in a halter/showmanship class and 3 years old to be shown in a riding class.

Halter Classes:

Stock Type: For horses with the appearance of a stock horse, such as American Quarter Horses, Appaloosas, Paint Horses, etc.

Non-Stock Type: For horses with a lighter body build, including but not limited to Arabian, Thoroughbred, Morgan, Saddlebred, etc.

Grade or registered horses of mixed breeds should be classified by visible breed characteristics and predominant breed genetics.

Special Class Descriptions:

Egg & Spoon – Riders will carry an egg on a spoon at various gaits. Riders will enter the arena and space themselves on the rail; once all riders are on the rail and have been given an egg and spoon, the class will begin. Once the class begins riders may not place any fingers on the egg to stabilize it. Riders will go to the center of the arena as their eggs fall. The last rider with an egg is declared the winner. The class will be a walk-trot class and will not affect exhibitors entering loping classes.

Follow Me – Exhibitors will encourage their horse/pony/mule to follow them to a set location within the arena and back across the start/finish line without the aid of a lead rope, rein, etc. Exhibitors may not touch their animal once they have crossed the start/finish line. Aids such as a feed bucket, treats, etc., may be used.

Dress Code

Exhibitors will adhere to the dress code as outlined in the Kansas 4-H Horse Show Rule Book (found online at [KANSAS HORSE PROJECT DRESS CODE](#)) during all classes while keeping in mind the Douglas County Fair 4-H Horse Show is a casual show with a learning environment. Exhibitors in timed events are permitted to wear the Official Douglas County Fair 4-H T-Shirt which may be purchased when entering the fair. The Douglas County 4-H Horse program supports the use of ASTM certified/SEI approved safety helmets in all equine events. Bicycle helmets or any other style of helmet are not allowed.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. The following classes will be entered in Building 21. At check-in, 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging of one horticulture entry. Judging consultation will take place during the entry time. Refer to main schedule for times.
3. A 4-H member may enter each class. The number of items for exhibit for any of the below classes is listed with the class. For further information, consult Exhibiting Fruits and Vegetables, KSU Extension Publication C 405.
4. All varieties should be named on entry. Vegetables and fruits should be displayed on plain white paper plates. Exhibitors are expected to provide their plates for display.
5. The number of vegetables to be exhibited is as follows:
Large Vegetables (One each): watermelon, squash, large pumpkin, kohlrabi, gourds, eggplant, cabbage, cantaloupe, and other large vegetables.

Medium Vegetables (Five each): cucumbers, tomatoes, beets, white onions, yellow onions, red onions, bell peppers, other peppers, okra, parsnips, radishes, turnips, sweet potatoes, red potatoes, white or Russet potatoes, carrots, miniature pumpkin, decorative gourds, garlic, or other medium vegetables.

Small Vegetables (Twelve Each): Green snap beans, cherry & pear tomatoes, yellow wax beans, and other small vegetables.

Other Vegetables limit of 2 entries per exhibitor.

Small Fruits (One half pint box): Strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, or other similar sized fruits

Tree fruits (5 each): Apples, pears, peaches, or similar sized fruits.

Grapes (2 bunches)

Vegetables should be mature, and uniformity will be considered with medium and small vegetables.

6. Garden Display – Garden Display: Each exhibitor in this class will be limited to four square feet of space. The Garden Display must be exhibited in a tray, basket or container that can be easily moved by the fair staff. The exhibit consists of five different types of fresh vegetables or fruits. Canned products and shelled vegetables are not acceptable. Only one variety of each type of vegetable or fruit may be exhibited. The numbers of the five types of vegetables or fruits to be exhibited are as follows:

- **Large Vegetables** (One Each): Cabbage, Cantaloupe, Eggplant, Large Pumpkin, Squash, Watermelon
- **Medium Vegetables** (Five Each): Beets, Carrots, Cucumbers, Decorative Gourds, Potatoes, Miniature Pumpkins, Okra, Onions, Peppers, Radishes, Sweet Potatoes, Tomatoes, garlic, or other similar sized vegetables
- **Small Vegetables** (Twelve Each): Green snap beans, wax beans, English peas, cherry & pear tomatoes, or other similar sized vegetables
- **Small fruits** (One half pint box): Strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, or other similar sized fruits.
- **Tree fruits** (5 each): Apples, pears, peaches, or similar sized fruits. • **Grapes** (2 bunches)

Quality and condition of exhibit will be considered. Choose vegetables for exhibit that will hold up well during the Fair. Avoid over-ripe or over-mature specimens. Those that are slightly under-ripe or slightly immature when picked may last longer.

7. Educational Exhibit (can include notebook, poster, display, or other type of exhibit designed to inform viewer about horticulture projects). The display will be limited to a maximum space of 2' x 2' x 3'. Maximum size will be strictly enforced. Poster size limited to 14" x 22". Basis of awards - Educational 40, interest and originality 20, appearance 20, and quality of display material 20.
8. 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging on one (1) entry.

Photos taken from the same location before, during and after the completion of the project are particularly helpful. The display will be limited to a maximum space of 2' x 2' x 3'. Maximum size will be strictly enforced. Poster size limited to 14" x 22".

INTERIOR DESIGN & ARCHITECTURE 4-H

Department 250
Superintendent: TBD

Architecture and Design is an important aspect of creating work and living environments that feel good and serve a purpose to those who utilize them. Designing the feel, look or mood of a room with lighting, furniture, wall placement and design elements are all examples of ways to incorporate the design process into your environment. Learning and experimenting with the elements of design – color, line, value, space, shape form and texture, is important. Of equal importance is knowing how to work with the principles of design – proportion, scale, balance, rhythm, unity and variety. Being a designer (architect, industrial/product designer, interior architect or interior designer) starts with having an end goal in mind and using each step of the planning process to support the end goal. Good designers understand how design makes a space look good and the components needed to put it together. The overarching goal is to create a space that is structurally sound, safe, inclusive, functional, and inviting to all.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Consultation judging is offered at entry time. Refer to the schedule of events for date and time for entries.
3. One entry per class.

Interior Design Focus:

Interior Designers have a capacity to influence the way we feel when we inhabit a space. In some instances, this impact can be felt emotionally and physically, in other words, it can affect our mood. Tools such as color, light, texture and pattern can all be used to convey or stimulate such a response to a space.

251 – Room Design Board

Select one room within your home or imaginary/future home (bedroom, bathroom, kitchen, etc.) to design. Create a basic floor plan showing the wall footprint, including any furniture, fixture, and/or cabinet layout. Include any other illustrations, drawings, or photographs to help support your design. Also include material/finish samples (wall treatments, floor covering, paint samples, etc.) Label any drawings or finishes so the audience understands their intention. All finishes should be attached to the design board. To explain your design intent, write a brief description to be included on the design board. (no more than one-page 8 1/2 x 11). Boards must be on foam core or a standard tri-fold display.

252 – Two Collages on Design Board

In this project, you will develop two imaginary interior rooms. Each room should start out with identical dimensions and features (doors, windows, etc.) The room's function can be up to you (bedroom, coffee shop, art studio, etc.) but should be the same for both rooms. For each space, create a feeling or mood for the occupants of the space. The mood created for one space should be the opposite or contrast to the second space. Choose a pair of contrasting words from the list provided (where do we put the list) to get started. Each collage must be on its own page. Page size preference and maximum is 11 x 17; can use smaller dimensions if needed. Collages should convey a space that includes background, midground, and foreground. Once these are established, add as many layers as needed. Use print materials from magazines, colored paper, the internet, or other design materials to find furniture, lighting fixtures, textures, and other elements to complete each collage. For each collage, write a brief description of your design intent. (one to three paragraphs total). Adhere to both collages and design intent on a foam core presentation board. Label each collage with the descriptive words you selected from the list. Additionally, you may include research, inspirational imagery or any additional drawings that helped you design your space.

253 – Two Diorama Models

Similar to class 4401, 4-H Members will construct two dioramas, one for each space demonstrating contrasting moods. Each diorama will be designed within similar sized boxes. Boxes should be large enough to be easily viewed but no larger than 12" x 18". Both rooms being depicted need to be the same size. Dioramas should convey a space that includes a background, midground, and foreground. Once you have these established, you can add as many layers as needed. Use print materials from magazines, colored paper, the internet, or other

design materials to find furniture, lighting fixtures, textures, and other elements to complete each room or diorama. Elements will need to be cut out and adhered to each background, midground, and foreground to reflect the room's design. Focus on selecting materials and colors to create the mood or essence of space. Use openings in your container to experiment with the effect of light in your space. Dioramas should not contain actual figures, miniature furniture/cabinets, or moveable parts. All elements should be paper adhered to materials easily found at home. For example, magazine photos, cardstock, plastic, cardboard, chipboard, or other materials to depict design finishes/elements within the diorama.

Architecture Focus:

Architects plan, design, and oversee the construction of buildings and other structures, beginning with concept development to the final construction phase of projects. It's also important that they ensure the final product is safe and functional. Architects balance artistic creativity with sound building techniques while also considering how the built environment impacts people's emotions and lifestyle.

4403 – Marble Maze or Enclosure

Create a space in which a marble will move through a sequence of rooms, enclosures, or spaces. Use different types of elements and materials to enclose your spaces or guide the marble. Consider the size of the marble and how you want the space to feel – big and open or small and enclosed. Pay close attention to the sizes of architectural elements relative to the size of the marble. To construct the marble maze or enclosure, use household materials found around the home to create the structure. (cardboard, chipboard, construction paper, paper towel or toilet paper tubes, etc.). The base of the structure should be no larger than 18" x 24" (poster board size) and 12" in height. In addition to your enclosure/maze, you may also present a small design board with illustrations/drawings to help the audience understand the path of travel for the marble or the rules for which you designed. Write or type a brief description of your design intent (1-3 paragraphs total) to be included on the design board.

4405 – Marble Maze Presentation Board Only

The presentation board should be foam core with the items below attached. Include drawings of your marble enclosure/maze design (examples include floor plan, section, elevations, etc.) In addition to your base drawings, include any illustrations/drawings to help your audience understand the path of travel for the marble. You may also include quality photographs that show the sequence of the marble moving through the built design. Images may be annotated, meaning you can use notes to explain your thoughts/design intent, on the board. This sequence of photos should visually tell the story of your design. Write or type a brief description of your design intent (1-3 paragraphs in total) to be included on the presentation board.

LLAMA AND ALPACA 4-H/FFA

Rules

1. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Self-Determined project to exhibit Llamas and/or Alpaca.
2. Exhibitor must own and manage llamas for at least 90 days prior to the fair, or lease the llama/alpaca, with the Leasing A Llama/Alpaca ID form on file at the Extension office by June 15.
3. Pre-enter Llama/Alpaca entries by June 30.
4. Exhibitors may exhibit only one animal in each class.
5. Per ALSA guidelines, the Public Relations will include, at a minimum, stairs, or ramp, petting by a stranger, loading in a vehicle or trailer, backing, and picking up a foot or showing teeth.
6. Per ALSA guidelines, the Obstacle Course will include, at a minimum, a bridge or ramp, jump, flexibility, and maneuvering, change of pace, and backing.
7. Showmanship is based on the exhibitor's basic skill in fitting, grooming, following directions, and style in presenting the animal to the judge.

8. Costume will judge on (a) difficulty in training animals to accept and exhibit costume, (b) time and energy involved, and (c) originality.
9. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. Inspection will take place before the animal(s) have been unloaded at the fairgrounds. Animals determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts, or infested with mange will not be permitted to show.
10. Classes may be split between Llama and Alpaca depending on enrollment numbers.

MEAT GOAT 4-H/FFA

Department 42

Superintendents: *Richard & Kelly Williams and William Vesecky*

Rules

1. Read General Rules.
2. Pre-enter Meat Goats by June 30.
3. All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified by Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
4. Exhibitors may enter no more than three (3) goats per class.
5. In all classes an exhibitor is the owner of the animal. Leased breeding animals must have a lease ID form signed and on file in the Extension Office by June 15.
6. Market goats must be less than one (1) year of age as of August 1 of the current year. Wethers or Does may be shown as market goats. Does cannot be shown as breeding if they are entered in market classes and vice versa. Wether market goats must be physical castrates.
7. Market goats must be weighed and identified to a 4-H'er enrolled in Goats in the spring at a date designated by the Extension Office.
8. Market goats will be shown by weights. Meat goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds (to be considered for Grand or Reserve) and can be any breed or combination of goat breeds. No maximum weight.
9. Bracing meat goats is allowed. Exhibitors may use collars, collars with a short lead, or halters when showing. Medium (3mm or smaller) pinch collars will be allowed. Exhibitors may only briefly (2 seconds or less) touch their animal to set legs. Superintendent has the right to disqualify violators.
10. All meat goats must have baby teeth in place with no visible signs of permanent teeth. The decision of the mouthier is final.
11. All Market goats must be "slick shorn" with an equal amount of hair above the knee and hock (head and belly excluded) prior to check-in at show time. A maximum of 3/8" hair length is permitted.
12. Goats are suggested to be dehorned. However, if horns are left, they must be tipped and rounded.
13. Physical abuse of any animal will not be tolerated and there will be grounds for disqualification. Show superintendent has the right to interpret this rule.
14. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary inspection. Inspection will take place before the animal(s) have been unloaded at the fairgrounds. Goats determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts, or infested with mange will not be permitted to show.
15. All sexually intact goats (does and bucks) must be identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA ID tag.

16. For animals to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animals in a regular class. NO animal may be entered in showmanship without also being shown in a regular class. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.

12. No State Fair classes for Pets.
13. Proof of vaccination form must be completed by veterinarian and presented to the superintendent at check in time. These are available at the Extension Office.
14. Cats: all applicable vaccinations must be up to date: Rabies, Feline Distemper, and Feline Leukemia. Feline Leukemia is mandatory for all outdoor cats. It is recommended, but not required, for indoor cats
15. Ferrets: No vaccinations required.
16. Cloverbuds, age 5 and 6, can give a short "show and tell" presentation to develop self-confidence, to feel the satisfaction of having completed an activity, and to learn it's the process and fun of participating and not the product, which is important. This is a non-competitive event and every Cloverbud will receive a participation ribbon.

PHOTOGRAPHY 4-H

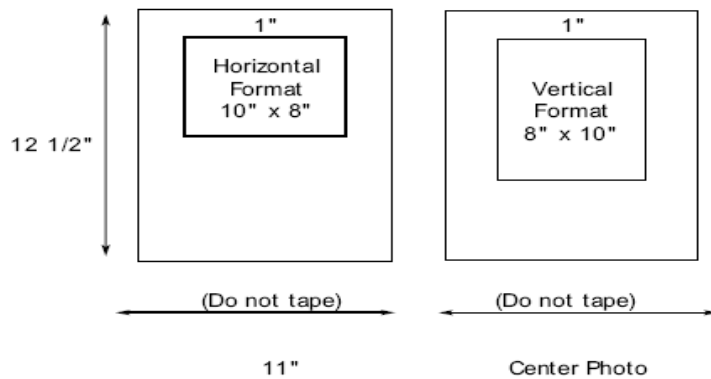

Tell your story through photography. This project helps capture unique and fun photos of friends, family, pets, nature, and important events in your life that you want to document. Learn how to plan, compose, light, and exhibit your photos. Learn the basics of using a smartphone or camera and advance into wide-angle and telephoto lenses, filters, light meters, and computer enhancement. Photos are judged on composition, technique and appeal.

Rules

1. Read General Rules.
2. Consultation judging is offered but not required for all classes.
3. Black and white prints and color photographic prints and/or videos may be exhibited.
4. Exhibitors may enter 2 prints in the color photo class, one print in the black and white class.
5. The photographs entered must be the result of the current year's project work by the 4-H member and photos must be taken by the 4-H member (exhibitor).
6. All photos must be no larger than 8" x 10" and no smaller than 7"x 9", after trimming.
7. Photos are to be mounted across the narrow (11") dimension of an 11" x 12.5" sheet of white or cream studio matte board. Photos mounted on poster board or foam board will not be displayed. Contact the Extension office to purchase matte boards.



8. Photos must be mounted with the top edge of the print 1" below the top of the mount. (Board is always oriented narrow side up). The sides of the print must be equal distance from the two sides of the mount.
9. Improperly mounted photos, oversize or undersize photos or photos with the white borders not removed or lettering (including dates) on the photo, will be awarded a ribbon one placing lower than the placing determined by the official judges. A full coverage permanent mount using a spray adhesive must be used. Do not use household glues, glue sticks, double stick tape/patches, etc. to adhere photo to matte board. Photos not mounted correctly will be lowered one ribbon placing after judging.
10. Appropriate photo subject matter: Photographic subject matter is expected to follow 4-H standards. For a sense of prohibited subject matter, review the Kansas 4-H member Code of Conduct; in general, if it is not allowable at a 4-H event, it is not allowable in a 4-H photograph at the Fair.
11. No lettering, including dates, is permitted on the front of the mount or on the photo. No underlay or borders are to be used.
12. To protect exhibits from dust, fingerprints, and moisture, place mounted photo in protective plastic sleeve that can be obtained from the Extension office.
13. On the back, write; the exhibitor's name, 4-H club, photo class, location where the photograph was taken and no more than 3 sentences of information about the photograph that you may want to share with the judge.
14. Photos entered in any class of the 4-H Photography Division at the Douglas County Fair may be used in the Douglas County Fair 4-H Photography judging contest. Entry of a photo in the 4-H Photography Division contest grants permission to use the photo in the 4-H Photography Judging Contest.
15. Improperly mounted photos, oversize or undersize photos or photos with the white borders not removed or lettering (including dates) on the photo, will be awarded a ribbon one placing lower than the placing determined by the official judges.
16. Photographs taken with a digital camera are allowed no more adjustments than exposure, color intensity or correction, one click filter effects, red eye removal, cropping, dodging and burning, and HDR (high dynamic range). Please note: AI (artificial intelligence) modified images are not allowed

17. Digital Composite Image: Finished photo must be created from two or more original images photographed by exhibitor. HDR photos do not qualify for this class. Photos will be judged on photographic merit as well as manipulation technique and process.
18. The black and white class is for black and white prints only. Monochromatic prints, including sepia prints are considered color photos and must be entered in the appropriate color photo class.
19. Photos with live subject(s) on railroad right of way or taken from railroad right of way property will not be displayed in Kansas 4-H Photography and will be disqualified and not judged.
20. Copyright protections must be observed.
21. Decisions as to display and/or penalties will be made by the Photography Superintendent and the Fair Board.
21. Champion and Reserve Champion exhibits in each entry level will compete for the overall Grand Champion and Reserve Champion awards.

296 My Favorite 4-H Photography

This class is only for those photography project members with 10 or more years of experience. This class is a non-judged, mounted display consisting of four favorite photos from the member's photography career in 4-H. All four photos will be mounted with a fifth mount reserved for a one-page, printed, or handwritten narrative/description that details each photo and why the exhibitor regards these photos as their most significant work. Photos and narrative/description will be displayed on one row of the photography racks. This class provides an alternate way to showcase the development and accomplishments of the 4-H member's photography career. Members who display in My Favorite 4-H Photography Display can still enter two other classes

1. This is a "display only" class.
2. Eligible members must have enrolled in photography for ten (10) or more years.
3. Requirements are: A. Choose a total of four (4) of your favorite photos from any of the years enrolled in photography. If used previously in competitive exhibits, remove all data slips and stickers. If the photo is an unmounted print, mount it using standard 4-H requirements and mat board. B. Develop a short biography piece. -Tell how/when an interest in photography began. -Explain why each of the four photos is a favorite. - Share the skills learned because of photography. Think beyond camera skills and include leadership, community service, etc. -Tell of any mentors/leaders you worked with. -Share workshops or camps pertaining to photography you attended. -Explain (if relevant) any plans to use photography skills beyond 4-H/High School. -Include a small (2 x 3) photo of yourself at the start of the biography. -Print the biography document and mount it on a standard mat board.
4. Place name and Extension unit on the back of each of the 5 mat boards in the upper right-hand corner.
5. This exhibit does not have to qualify at the county/district level to exhibit at the Kansas State Fair.

297 Growth Portfolio

1. Members are eligible for this class beginning with the third year of enrollment in the 4-H photography project.
2. The exhibit will consist of one photo for each year of enrollment. Each photo must have been created in a different year and must be labeled with the year taken/project enrollment year. A maximum of 5 photos may be included if the member has 5 or more years of enrollment. Photos are not required to be in consecutive order. For example, a nine-year-old with three years of enrollment in photography is eligible to enter a growth portfolio. The portfolio in this example should have one photo from the seven-year-old year, one photo from the eight year-old year, and one photo from the nine-year-old's year. The growth portfolio class may start at any time in the member's photography career. For an older member, the growth portfolio would represent any five years in the project, for example, years 1,3,5,7 and 9 for a member having project enrollment totaling 9 years.

3. Photos must be 8" x 10" and may be color or black and white and must be unmounted.
4. An information sheet must accompany each photo, giving the brand and model of the camera used to create the photo. Setting for focal length, aperture, mode and shutter speed must also be listed. The skill set used to create the photo must be given and fully explained. The main goal for each year should also be given. The form for this information is available on the Kansas4h.org website, it is a form-fillable document and is required.
5. The Skill set used to create the photo must be given and explained. The main goal of each year should be listed.
5. Beginning with photo 2, member description of GROWTH in project skill must be included on information sheet.
6. The exhibit will consist of an introductory page, skill sheet, and photos from each year's photos arranged chronologically and in a portfolio book. The skill sheet will go on the left-hand page, and unmounted photos will be on the right-hand page.

297 Career Portfolio

1. Member must have been enrolled in Photography for five (5) or more years OR member must be age 15 – 19 and been enrolled in photography for at least two (2) years.
2. Exhibit will consist of ten (10) 8" x 10" photos showing skill development in one of the following photography areas: Portraiture, Special Effects (note done with computer), Landscape, Photojournalism, Black and White, Nature/Wildlife or Graphic Design (computer skills with photos). All photos must be the result of the current 4-H enrollment year.

4. An information sheet must accompany each photo giving brand and model of camera used to create the photo. The settings for focal length, aperture, mode, and shutter speed must also be listed.
5. A one-page summary should accompany the portfolio listing the goal for pursuing this area of photography and what skills were learned while doing so. Mentors should be acknowledged. Career exploration can also be described.
6. Exhibit will be presented in a notebook designed for portfolio review with pages for required information from #4 and #5.

All poultry (except waterfowl & pigeons) are required to show proof of being P-T clean by one of the following: Originate from a certified U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock if coming from a hatchery or out of state (certificate required at check-in) or show proof of negative test at check-in of the county fair. Blood test must be within 90 days of show.
10. NO BIRDS MAY BE REMOVED BEFORE RELEASE TIME ON SUNDAY, (except those meat pens sold in the 4-H livestock auction). ALL BIRDS MUST REMAIN AT THE FAIRGROUNDS, EVEN IF YOU HAVE SOLD THEM TO A 3RD PARTY, UNTIL RELEASE TIME ON SUNDAY.
11. For animals to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animal in a regular class. No animal may be entered in showmanship without also being shown in a regular class. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.
12. All birds must be tagged with a leg band identifier. Tags may be purchased at the Extension Office.

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Exhibitor may enter one of the following: notebook, display or poster telling about work done in their project per project area.
3. Exhibitor may have entries in more than one project area. At check-in, 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging of one project display entry.
4. No project manuals or records should be entered.
5. The display will be limited to a maximum size of 3' wide x 4' tall. Maximum size will be strictly enforced. Tri-fold display boards, as used in science fair exhibits, may be used.
6. Poster size limited to no larger than 22" x 28".
7. Basis of awards - Educational 40, interest and originality 20, appearance 20, and quality of display material 20.
8. Wildlife - Exhibitors must comply with State and Federal laws. It is illegal to possess threatened or endangered wildlife, or the feathers, nests, or eggs of non-game birds. Game birds and game animals taken legally during an open season may be used. The use of live wild animals in educational exhibits is prohibited.
9. Shooting Sports - Display size will be limited to a maximum size of 3' wide x 4' tall. Exhibitors must comply with State and Federal laws. No "live" ammunition containing propellant or explosive powders may be used in any display! Artistic substitutes must be used in lieu of powder and "live" ammunition. Label artistic substitutes on back for clarification. Name, county, age, and year in project should be on the front of the poster or display. Exhibits will not be accepted if they are related to reloads.
10. No State Fair exhibits in this division, except for Shooting Sports and Wildlife.

Rules

1. Read General Rules.
2. Pre-enter Rabbit entries by June 30, including ear tattoos. Substitution of ear tattoos is allowed until noon on Thursday before check-in on Monday. The substitution must be in the same class, breed, variety, and sex. You may not switch classes. Please double-check the special entry form for correctness.
3. All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified by Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
4. Errors with the breed, class, type, age, and/or sex identification will be disqualification at fair entry time.
5. Coop tags will be placed on coops by the superintendents before the time of entry. Showmanship papers will be handed out on the day of the show by the show clerk; it will be your responsibility to pick these up before the show begins. You will need these to be allowed to show.
6. All rabbits must be owned by June 15 of the current year. Leased breeding animals must have a lease ID form signed and on file in the Extension Office by June 15.
7. Each rabbit must be legibly and permanently tattooed in its left ear for identification. There will be no tattooing once a rabbit is on the fairgrounds. Permanent marker tattoos are not allowed. Please contact the superintendent for tattooing ahead of time.
8. All ARBA and State fair guidelines will be followed. Any breed recognized by the American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) will be allowed to show. Each recognized ARBA color constitutes a variety. Classes will be divided according to ARBA rules and judged according to ARBA's "Standard of Perfection". Please check the minimum and maximum weights for your breed against your rabbits. If yours aren't within these requirements, they will be disqualified. No mixed breed of rabbit will be shown.
9. Exhibitors shall have no more than one (1) rabbit per class (i.e., each exhibitor can have only ONE solid senior Mini Lop doe). Exhibitors may enter a maximum of 20 rabbits.
10. All rabbits will be divided into age classes (pre-junior, junior, 6-8 months, and senior) and judged according to their breed standard.
11. If you have a breed that is not listed, please contact the superintendents for the correct way to enter your rabbit. AOB will no longer be a class to enter a rabbit in. To ensure your breed is accepted, you must contact the superintendents.
12. Any rabbit that is pre-entered in showmanship and fur class must be entered in a regular class. Fur class pre-entries need to be marked for the type of fur class only; our tattoos will be reported on the day the rabbit is entered at the fair, not the day of the show. Exhibitors may enter one (1) rabbit in each fur class for a maximum of eight (8) total fur entries. Any rabbit disqualified in the regular classes will not be allowed to show in the fur classes or used for showmanship.
13. If you cannot be present to show your rabbit, please notify the superintendents before the show. If you are present and need help, your parents may not assist you in the ring. Parents may not help carry rabbits from pens to the judging table. Parents/Guardians may help in moving rabbits from the barn to the arena. However, no parents are allowed in the show arena. Moving the rabbit from the cage to the show table is the exhibitor's responsibility, and should the exhibitor be unable to do so, assistance should be requested from the superintendents or other exhibitors.
14. There will be two (2) calls for rabbits in each class before judging begins. The show table closes at the time for any missing rabbits. The exhibitor is responsible for knowing the show order and having rabbits at the judging arena and judging table on time.

15. Rabbits used in showmanship must be entered in the regular show. List the showmanship contest on your pre-entries. If a rabbit is disqualified from the regular show, it shall not be exhibited in showmanship.
16. A rabbit judging contest will be held on Thursday during the judging of the rabbits. All rabbit exhibitors are encouraged to participate in the rabbit judging contest. This must be listed on the pre-entry form.
17. Cable ties will be put in rabbit cages at 6:00 p.m. for the rabbits' safety.
18. Livestock exhibitors are required to clean their livestock pens or stalls at the conclusion of the fair. All rabbits and equipment must be out of the barn and cleaning completed by the end of the pre-determined check out time. All premiums will be forfeited if rabbits are left in the barn and stalls are not properly cleaned.
19. All rabbits exhibited in the meat pen classes must present a drug withdrawal form upon check-in of the rabbit. If this cannot be provided, the rabbits will be disqualified.
20. No diseased or unhealthy rabbits will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Any unhealthy rabbit will be released by the rabbit superintendent.
21. For an animal to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA, members must own and exhibit the animal in a regular class. No premiums are paid in showmanship.

ROBOTICS 4-H

Department 310

Superintendent: *Breven Flory*

The Kansas 4-H Robotics program is designed to allow 4-H members to explore robotics through robots of various designs.

1. RULES:

2. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the Kansas 4-H Robotics project to exhibit in this division.
3. Each exhibitor may enter one robot per class. Exhibits must have been constructed and/or completed during the current 4-H year.
4. Each exhibit must include a robot; information packets are not a sufficient exhibit.
5. Robots must have automated (electric, pneumatic, hydraulic, etc.) articulated structures (arms, wheels, grippers, pneumatic, hydraulic, etc.). Game consoles that are displayed on a screen are not considered robots and should either be entered in computer systems division or electronics and renewable energy division. Robots requiring no assembly, just programming, such as Ozobots, are considered computer science projects as the skill is focused on the programming not on the construction of the robot.
6. Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. If displayed in a case (not required) the outside case dimensions may not be more than 26 inches in height, width, or depth. The display case should have the exhibitor's information attached to both the base and cover, as the top part (lid) of the case may be separated from the display.
7. Materials including but not limited to USB drives, obstacles, spare batteries, and mats for testing the robot may be brought by the exhibitor on the day of judging and those materials not essential to the exhibit may be taken home following completion of judging.
8. All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure, specifically circuit boards. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.

9. Robots may be powered by a battery, water, air, elastic energy devices (rubber bands, ballons, etc.) or solar source only. Junk drawer robots may be powered by a non-traditional power source. Robots powered by fossil fuels/flammable liquids will be disqualified. Robots that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified.
10. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession, or creation, physical and/or electrical that could be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.
11. Remote control robots are allowed under certain conditions provided that the robot is not drivable. Robotic arms (hydraulic or electric) are allowed. A remote is allowed provided more than a single action happens when a single button is pressed on the remote, for example “a motor spins for 3 seconds, at which point an actuator is triggered, then the motor spins for 3 more seconds.” Remote controlled cars, boats, planes and/or action figures, etc. are not allowed. Robotic arms and hand extensions are allowed.
12. Each robot must be in working condition. The judges will operate each robot to evaluate its workmanship and its ability to complete its intended task. In the event the robot uses a phone, tablet, or similar device for programming AND control of the robot, a video can be used to evaluate the working condition of the robot.
13. Each exhibitor is required to complete the “4-H Robotics Exhibit Information Form” which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <https://robotics.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10” x 13” manila envelope. All revisions of all forms previously released for the STEM division, either undated or dated prior to current year are void for use and new forms must be obtained and used that are dated by the State 4-H Office for the current year. Use of old forms would result in the loss of one ribbon placement for exhibits.
14. The exhibit must include written instructions for operation (the instructions should be written as if they were to tell a grandparent or elderly person how to operate the robot), construction plans, and one to three pages of project photographs. For robots that can be programmed, robot programming information must be included. This information should be placed inside the 10” x 13” manila envelope mentioned above. Robot programming information can be, but not limited to, source code, block diagrams, screen captures of the coding window, and other images that show the programming logic used.
15. If the robot uses a device like a phone, iPad, or tablet for programming AND operation, DO NOT leave the device (phone, tablet, etc.) at the fair. The device’s safety cannot be ensured. Bring it with you the day of judging.
16. For State Fair, each exhibit should include a video of the youth following their instructions for operation. This allows judges to get a better understanding of the exhibit and allows the youth the opportunity to fully demonstrate their exhibit. The video should be no longer than 8 minutes and should be placed on the CD, DVD, USB drive, or similar.
17. Creativity, workmanship, and functionality will be strong criteria in judging the “Robot designed by Exhibitor” classes. All robots should have a purpose or intended function, examples include, but are not limited to following a line, sweeping the floor, solving a rubix cube, sorting colors, or climbing stairs.
18. Exhibitor’s name(s) and county or district must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the robot,
19. There are no county or district boundaries that must be adhered to to form a Kansas 4-H Robotics team. However, as mentioned in #1, each team member must be currently enrolled in the Kansas 4-H Robotics project.
20. See general rules regarding specific educational display, notebook, and poster board rules.

SEWING & TEXTILE DESIGN [CONSTRUCTION]

Department 150

This project will teach you the basics, such as sewing a pillowcase or shirt, learning different stitches, or putting in a zipper. Learn to create and sew your own clothing and accessories while exploring the world of fashion and how to take the design of your choice and customize it for the perfect look, color, and fit.

Rules

1. ALL JUDGING FOR THIS DEPARTMENT WILL TAKE PLACE BEFORE THE FAIR. REFER TO THE SCHEDULE OF EVENTS FOR DATES AND TIMES. However, to receive the ribbon and premium money, the 4-H'er must bring the exhibit to the Fair and enter it during exhibit entry time. At that time the ribbon placing will be awarded based on judging.
2. During the judging the 4-H'er will have an opportunity to participate in a consultation judging for Constructed, Recycled Clothing Project, and Educational Exhibits. (If unable to attend, they may have another 4-H'er, their leader, or a parent bring their exhibit to be judged.) In addition to this, they may participate in the Modeling Showcase judging. (See the following MODELING SHOWCASE below) DETAILS WILL BE AVAILABLE IN A SPECIAL EMAIL CLOSER TO THE FAIR.

3. A 4-H'er may enter 5 Constructed Article/Garment/Outfit, 1 Educational Exhibit, and 1 Recycled Clothing Project.

Constructed Article, Garment or Outfit: Any item that the 4-H'er has hand or machine sewn for themselves or others can be exhibited here. For the Modeling Showcase, most of the outfits must be constructed and modeled by the 4-H member who made the garment/outfit. Everything which is commonly considered an outer garment must be constructed (vest, jacket, dress, skirt, pants, coat, etc.) This class is also for any garment or item that was constructed by the 4-H'er for a unique purpose and meant for limited use (i.e., a Halloween costume, performance costume, holiday decoration, special event outfit, etc.) It will be judged by construction standards that support its use. Creativity and suitability for the occasion are the basic criteria for judging. A sweater, blouse or shirt that is worn underneath another constructed garment can be purchased or made.

Educational Exhibit: Share with others what you learned in a clothing construction project. Exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook, or display. Follow copyright laws as explained in the General Rules as you are preparing your exhibit. Take care to select durable materials that will withstand fair conditions. No card table displays are allowed. If the exhibit is a poster, it must not be larger than 22" x 28". If the exhibit is a display, maximum size is 2' x 3' tri-fold display board. Name and county must be clearly marked on educational exhibits.

Recycled Clothing Project: An item made of at least 50% recycled material (recycled means reusing an existing item in a new way). This could be remaking/redesigning a garment, re-purposing a clothing item for a new use, etc. Item must include sewing of some kind. A 4" x 6" index card MUST accompany entry describing the recycled materials and how they were used in the item.

4. Articles, garments, outfits may be used/worn but should be carefully laundered or cleaned before being exhibited. If soiled, they will not be displayed.
5. Precut kits are acceptable for all clothing classes. All articles/garments must be finished for use.
6. Since care labels are not always available, NO care label will be required; however, 4-H members should know how to care for fabrics they purchase.
7. Exhibitors may not repeat outfits in consecutive years.
8. Exhibitors will be allowed to leave exhibits after judging has taken place. Exhibits must have a proper entry tag (provided at the time of check-in) attached and placed in the correct age level clothing rack.
9. At the State Fair a 4-H'er may enter a maximum of two exhibits in this division. One constructed piece and one individual educational exhibit. For State Fair exhibits you are encouraged to attach an index card or photo, no larger than 4" x 6" with the entry form to give the judge any information which the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know. Explain if the exhibit contains any recycled materials.

MODELING

1. Besides the consultation judging, 4-H'ers may participate in model judging held on the same day. Rules

1. Read General Rules.
2. Pre-enter Sheep entries by June 30. Leased breeding animals must have a lease ID form signed and on file in the Extension Office by June 15.
3. All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified by Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
4. Exhibitors may show no more than three (3) market lambs. The division will be made by weight if so warranted.
5. Lambs must be born on or after Jan. 1, of the current year.
6. To help prevent club lamb fungus at the Fair, all market lambs must be slick-sheared before bringing them to the fair. A maximum of 0.2 (two-tenths) inches of wool is permitted. And, if the ewes are sheared for the show, they must be sheared before unloading at the fair.
7. Each breed's Champion and Reserve Champion lambs will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
8. Champion and reserve ewes from each breed, other purebreds, and commercial or crossbred classes will show for Supreme and Reserve Supreme Breeding Ewe awards.
9. Animals shown in market classes are not eligible for breeding classes and vice versa. This applies to both 4-H and Open Class entries. Animals are considered either breeding or market animals, not both.
10. Market lambs must have been weighed and identified to a 4-H'er enrolled in sheep at the official spring weigh-ins in May and this information be recorded on official forms in the Douglas County Extension Office. Wether market lambs must be physical castrates.
11. Original registration or transfer papers for animals in breeding classes must be in the exhibitor's name by June 15 of the current year. Animals may be co-registered by 2 or more youth in the same family. Breeding animals registered in a farm name or whose papers include the name of adults are not eligible to show. 4-H/FFA breeding animals that are not registered may be shown in the Commercial classes.
12. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay a \$1 per animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. Inspection will take place before the animals are unloaded at the fairgrounds.
13. All sexually intact sheep (ewes and rams) and wethers must be identified with an official USDA premise ID tag. Lambs less than 8 weeks of age accompanying their dams are exempt from tagging requirements.

14. For animals to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animals in a regular class. No animal may be entered in showmanship without also being shown in a regular class. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.

Members must participate and be present at the PUBLIC MODELING SHOWCASE to receive recognition or awards. Ribbons and prize money will be withheld if the member does not participate.

SMALL ENGINES 4-H

Department 310

Superintendent: *Breven Flory*

Through Small Engines, you will have the opportunity to educate others about what youth have learned through the project or to promote the benefits of participation in the small engines project.

Rules

1. All exhibits should involve engines smaller than 20 horsepower.
2. Engine should contain no fuel in tanks or carburetor.
3. Displays are limited to 4' wide and 4' deep – both upright and floor displays.
4. A sheet of operating instructions must be furnished for any exhibit not self-explanatory.
5. Each Small Engine exhibit must include a "4-H Small Engine Information Form" available at the Extension

Office. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manilla envelope.

6. As exhibitors prepare their exhibits, appropriate PPE (Personal Protection Equipment) is required.
7. Cutting surfaces, such as blades, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam "pool noodles" and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
8. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at judge's discretion, may receive reduced ribbon placement or disqualification.

1805 Display – Exhibit a display, selecting one of the following options: 1) a display identifying different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or a display showing the function of the various engine or lawn and garden equipment parts; OR 2) a display identifying and explaining the function(s) of different special tools needed for small engine repair or maintenance; OR 3) a display illustrating and providing the results of any one of the experiments that are included in the project books. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws are permitted for display in this class. Maximum tri-fold or display board size is 3' x 4'. Items may not extend beyond the 24" from the back of the display board.

1806 Maintenance – Exhibit a display that illustrates either 1) Routine maintenance procedures OR 2) Diagnosing and troubleshooting specific problems in an engine. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws, etc. are permitted for display, using a maximum tri-fold size of 3' x 4'.

1807 Operation – Exhibit an operable small engine (no more than 20 HP) overhauled or rebuilt by the member. Include maintenance schedule for the engine and a brief description of steps taken by the member overhauling or rebuilding the engine. All exhibits in this division must be self-standing. The engine should not contain fuel in the tank or carburetor.

3. All youth participating in the livestock areas of Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine must be certified by Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) by June 15th of the current year to show.
4. Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of three (3) Market Hogs.
5. No exhibitor may show more than two (2) heads in each breeding class. Animals shown in market classes are not eligible for breeding classes and vice versa. This applies to both 4-H and Open Class entries. Animals are considered either breeding or market animals, not both.
6. Market Hogs and Breeding Gilts will be shown by breed. Purebred Market Hogs and Breeding Gilts must have original registration or transfer papers in the name of the exhibitor by June 15 of the current year. Animals may be co-registered by 2 or more youth in the same family but cannot be in a farm name or include the name of adults. If more than one class is needed for commercial breeding gilts per superintendent recommendations, class will be split on weight.
7. Feeder Hogs (Barrows or Gilts) - 219 lbs. and below - All breeds will be shown together. Classes will be broken by weight if so warranted. Animals in this class are not eligible to compete in Championship Class or to sell through livestock auction. Animals are eligible for showmanship class.
8. Market Hogs (barrows or gilt) - 220 lbs. minimum - shown by breed. Classes will be broken by weight if so warranted. Barrow market hogs must be physical castrates.
9. Champion and Reserve Champion hogs in each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.

10. Market Hogs must be identified to a 4-H'er enrolled in swine at the official spring identification day and this information be recorded on official forms in the Douglas County Extension Office.
11. At the time of pre-entry, all exhibitors will pay \$1/animal non-refundable fee for a veterinary visual inspection. An inspection will take place before the animals have been unloaded at the fairgrounds.
12. For animals to be exhibited in a showmanship class, 4-H/FFA members must own and exhibit animals in a regular class. No animal may be entered in showmanship without also being shown in a regular class. No premiums are paid in showmanship classes.

UNCREWED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS 4-H

Department 180

Superintendent: *Breven Flory*

The 4-H uncrewed aerial system or UAS project explores the world from above the trees and discovers new frontiers with UASs. UASs are commonly known as Uncrewed Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) or drones. Members

explore the uses and applications of uncrewed aerial systems, including how UASs link to other projects such as geology, robotics, electronics, crop science, and many more.

Rules

1. The 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the 4-H Uncrewed Aerial Systems (UAS) project to exhibit in this division.
2. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. The exhibit must have been completed during the current 4-H year.
3. The information that accompanies the UAS must be limited to the 4-H UAS Exhibit Information Form which is affixed to a 10" x 13" envelope. This envelope should NOT be attached to the UAS. This may be downloaded from <http://uas.engtech4ks.com/>. Any UAS exhibit not including this completed envelope will receive an automatic participation ribbon. All revisions of forms previously released for the STEM division dated prior to current year are void for use and new forms must be obtained and used that are dated by the Kansas State 4-H Office for the current year.
4. For state fair entries; each exhibit MUST include a video of the youth operating their UAS. This allows judges to get a better understanding of the exhibit and allows the youth the opportunity to fully demonstrate their exhibit. The video should be no longer than 8 minutes and should be placed on a CD, DVD, USB drive, or similar.
5. Exhibitor's name, county, age, and years(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the exhibit, educational display, notebook, and/or poster.
6. Uncrewed Aerial Systems that include or depict weaponry of any kind will be disqualified.
7. See general rules regarding specific educational display, notebook, and poster board rules.
8. If modifications are made to the exhibit a page should be attached noting those modifications.
9. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, may receive a reduced ribbon or disqualification.
10. For exhibits "designed and constructed by the exhibitor" the UAS must not be a mere modification of an existing kit or plan. You may not exhibit a UAS that is purchased off the shelf in this class.
11. For "practical application" exhibits, the exhibit must include the UAS, plus one or more of the following: video, notebook, poster, display board, etc. This class is separate from educational exhibits. A tangible use would be mapping Russian olive trees, eroded soils, and bindweed in fields, etc. There are also many other non-agricultural UAS uses that would be appropriate for this class.

3141 Uncrewed Aircraft System designed and constructed by the exhibitor that is operated by a remote-controlled device. The UAS must not be a mere modification of an existing kit or plan. You may not exhibit a UAS that is purchased off the shelf in this class.

3142 Practical application of an Uncrewed Aircraft System constructed from a commercial (purchased) kit. This includes the UAS, plus one or more of the following: video, notebook, poster, display board, etc. This class is separate from educational exhibits. A tangible use would be mapping Russian olive trees, eroded soils, and bindweed in fields, etc. There are also many other non-agricultural UAS uses that would be appropriate for this class.

The visual arts project teaches artistic skills and the elements and principles of design. 4-H members explore techniques, study art history and culture, and discover their talents. Be creative; draw, paint, and work with different mediums.

NOTE: Visual Arts include cutting, pasting, drawing, painting, sculpting, printing, 3-D construction, and fiber not included in Fiber Arts.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30. Exhibitors must be enrolled in Visual Arts.
2. An exhibitor may enter up to 4 exhibits per age level with no more than one entry from a kit.
3. **Each exhibit, except those from a KIT, should be the original work of the exhibitor.**
4. Visual art is considered to have been created primarily for visual purposes. It will be judged for its beauty, originality, and meaningfulness, specifically painting, sculpture, drawing, watercolor, and graphics. Crafts are objects that are intended to be useful or functional rather than purely visual, including ceramics, scrapbooking, basketry, jewelry, metalwork, and textiles.
5. Work should be matted, framed, or in acceptable form to display and hang. Mounts, mats, or frames need not be constructed by exhibitors. All exhibits that need to be hung must have a wire or saw tooth hanger attached to be properly displayed. Points will be deducted for exhibits that are not properly displayed.
6. For each visual art, complete the Visual Arts Exhibitor form found on the Douglas County Extension Service Website ([Forms](#)). Look under the 4-H tab for Exhibitor Forms. Each item must have an entry tag and a form when entering the exhibit.
7. 4-H'ers are encouraged, but not required, to sign up for consultation judging on one (1) entry.
8. No plants or plant materials needing watering can be entered as an art display or entered.
9. Designated exhibits will be selected to represent Douglas County at the State Fair. Each county may submit one entry from each of the five categories (Fine Arts, Clay and Ceramics, Leather, and Jewelry, Three-Dimensional, and General Crafts) for a total of five entries per county. If a county doesn't have an entry for one of the classes, they may submit a second entry in one of the other classes to meet the quota of five entries per county. 4-H'ers must be 9 years old and older to exhibit at the State Fair.

Rules

1. Read General Rules. Pre-enter by June 30.
2. Judging consultation is encouraged but not required in this division. Refer to the main schedule for entry date and times.
3. The plan from which the project was constructed must be included with the article exhibited. The plan may be a photocopy, the actual pattern, or a scale drawing. It must be complete and accurate to the extent that a duplicate article could be built using the plan as a guide. Please note: a set of step-by-step instructions is not a plan. If you draw your own plan, a scale of 1/4 inch equals one inch is suggested. Projects with missing or insufficient plans will lower one ribbon placing (i.e., a blue-ribbon exhibit will receive a red ribbon.)
4. Plans and all other paperwork should be secured to the project in some way. Tape is usually not adequate to accomplish this. It is recommended to use a zip top plastic bag with a hole punched through it and using string to tie this to the exhibit.
5. The use of materials other than wood, screws, nails, and adhesive should be kept to a minimum.
6. Label each article showing intended use, age, and years in woodwork.
7. Projects made from pre-cut kits are not allowed.
8. During construction of exhibits, PPE (personal protective equipment) is to be worn by those in the workspace.
9. In judging woodwork articles, consideration will be given to; workmanship, including accuracy to the plan; design; choice of wood; suitability and quality of finish; and usefulness.
10. Firearms and weapons will not be entered or displayed.
11. Extra pieces that go with your woodworking project (i.e. bean bags to go with a cornhole set, building blocks to go with a play table, etc.) SHOULD NOT be submitted with the project.

12. Projects with “fractal burning” are NOT ALLOWED in any Kansas State Fair Exhibits in the 4-H Youth Development Department. (Example – electrical burning to make black linework on artwork.) This is an agreement with The American Association of Woodturners (AAW).

7. All dried products must include the recipe and preparation steps. If dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered one ribbon rating. Suggested amount: 1/3 – ½ cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit All meat jerky must be heated to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F before or after drying. This is not the drying temperature! Dried products must include the recipe, preparation steps and heating instructions. Jerky not heated to 160 degrees F will be disqualified and not be judged.  8. All canning must be done after last year's fair and must be sealed in clear, clear glass standard glass (sweet spreads) 1/4-pint, 1/2 pint, or pint jars and (canned food) pint or quart jars with flats and screw bands in place. Paraffin exhibits will not be accepted. **No colored glass canning jars will be accepted.**
 9. Containers will not be opened by the judge.
 10. Dried Foods to be in small jars, clear plastic bags, or other "see-through" containers. Suggested amounts: 1/3-1/2 cup or 3-4 pieces. All meat jerkies must be cooked to 160 degrees F before drying.
 11. Liquid Honey must be exhibited in 3-pint standard canning or queenline honey jars. They will be judged on moisture content, clarity, flavor, aroma, and neatness in packaging.
 12. Comb Honey must be exhibited wrapped in Styrofoam cartons consisting of approximately 1 lb. sections. They will be judged on neatness, completion of comb and color. Wood Section or Round must be displayed in regular wood frames in proper box or displayed in rounds enclosed in clear plastic cylinders. They will be judged on neatness, completion of comb, cooking, etc.

4. Open to all.
5. Each contestant may enter as many pies on as many days as he/she desires.
6. Only baked fruit and pecan pies will be accepted in non-disposable or disposable pie plates. For food safety purposes, any pie with custard and cream cheese-type fillings or food requiring refrigeration will not be accepted. 5. No backing up or jerking the tractor will be allowed.
6. Keep your hands on the steering wheel, feet on the pedals and always stay seated.

Douglas County Fair 4-H Exhibitor Code of Conduct

The Douglas County Fair 4-H Exhibitor Code of Conduct is intended to foster a safe environment that encourages optimal learning and growth. The opportunity to participate in the Douglas County Fair is a privilege and not a right. All participants, parents/guardians, and volunteers are expected to uphold the values of the Douglas County 4-H Youth Development Program and conduct themselves according to the following standards listed below. The following Douglas County Fair 4-H Exhibitor Code of Conduct is a condition of participation in the 4-H division of the Douglas County Fair. **When I participate in the Douglas County Fair, I agree to:**

1. Be present, attentive, and engaged in the 4-H activities. Practice good sportsmanship, be helpful to others, uphold ethical practices in 4-H projects and events, and never cheat or falsely represent efforts related to 4-H project activities.
2. Know and follow federal, state, and local laws that apply to minors (e.g., no use of alcohol, illicit (non-prescribed) drugs, and tobacco in any form) even when I am 18 or 19 years old and still a program participant.
3. Use language and actions that do not substantially interfere with others' participation in the program. (Swearing, harassment, and bullying are not allowed).
4. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management or other exhibitors before, during or after a competitive event is prohibited. In furtherance of their official duty, all judges, volunteers, fair board members and Extension staff shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect. No person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward anyone.
5. Obey all rules and directives that apply to the county fair 4-H division where I am involved.
6. Apply these conduct standards to online 4-H activity, including social media and internet presence.
7. Good sportsmanship shall always be observed. The judges' decision is final. Poor sportsmanship may lead to loss of ribbon, class dismissal, or disqualification from the show as determined by the judge. Any protest should be made by writing to the Fair Board Rule Committee. Exhibitors, parents, and volunteers are not to be approaching the judge directly.

I acknowledge and agree to abide by the Douglas County Fair 4-H Exhibitor Code of Conduct. I agree to conduct myself in an honest, ethical, and upstanding manner. I understand disciplinary actions up to disqualification and forfeit of premiums will result if these rules are violated.
